The successful journalist needs to be a man who has attained a most liberal education, but the arts course of a modern university provides the opportunities for obtaining just such an education. The technical work of a journalist can only be obtained by practical experience, such as no school can give. And the special qualifications, the tenacity of purpose, the strength of character, all the personal qualifications which make a man better suited for this walk of life than for any other; these all must be inherunless they already exist, they cannot be picked up either by going to a special school, or by getting a temporary job in a newspaper office.

Still, the object sought to be accomplished is unquestionably a good one. And educators will watch with considerable interest the progress of the experiment. Which Takes Leading Place Amongst Precious Stones.

New York, Aug. 28.-With a peculiar, indescribable iridescence, the new stone-Krunzite-has taken its place among the gems of the world. A "rose-lilac" is the description given of the tint that marks this stone as unusual. Some six months ago, when a sample of the rock from which the stones are cut came to Tiffany's for classification, that shading caused the famous mineralogist, Dr. George F. Krunz, to pronounce it different from all known gems.

This first piece of the precious rock came from Mexico, it was said. Later is was learned that California is its home.
