Good early prospects for last year's crop encouraged a landowner on a long in particular tied themselves up with obligations of this nature to an extent that crippled them when the crop did not turn out nearly as well as was expected. Consequently they could not meet their season's bills at country stores, which in turn failed to liquidate with jobbers and wholesalers. The result was that this spring a very acute financial situation existed.

BEWARE THE HORSE THIEF.
"Almost every day," said Chief Gorman, of Galt, "we get notification of horse thefts. Some come from a long distance, but the most are within a radius of 50 miles. Hamilton neigh- borhood particularly seems infested with operatives among the farmers' stables. The horse and cattle thieves are bold. Only a short time ago eight head of fat steers were taken from a field in Wentworth County and never a trace of them has been discovered. The horses are spirited away just as mysteriously. My impression is that a gang of experienced thieves have come over from the States and are systematically working this province. Farmers, and in fact all who own horses, ought to be on their guard."

A GALLANT RESCUE.
The London Daily Graphic, of a recent date says: "We publish today a photograph of Lieut. Hugh Bogle, R.N., who gallantly rescued a lady from drowning in the Serpentine. Mrs. Greenwood, of Beaumont Mansions, was sculling by herself in a small boat and when near the west end bridge at South Kensington, she stood up in the boat. This caused it to overturn, and Mrs. Greenwood was thrown into about eight feet of water. Lieut. Bogle was crossing the bridge at the time, and without taking off any of his clothes, and with a lighted cigar in his mouth, he jumped over the bridge to the rescue. The handsome young lieutenant was last summer a visitor in this city, where he has a number of friends. He is a son of the late Admiral Bogle, of the British navy, and is not the only member of a family that has earned honorable mention for acts of bravery."

PETE LEWIS WINS

conviction for Having Two Bar- rooms on July 12 Quashed.

A Clinion dispatch says: The con- viction of P. B. Lewis for having more than one barroom on July 12, has been quashed on appeal. The regula- tions of the license commissioners of West Huron include one to the effect that the bar should not consist of more than one room. Lewis, to accommo- date the large number of customers on that holiday, erected a temporary counter in the hallway adjoining the bar. The police magistrate held this to be a breach of the regulation, but Judge Holt, in quashing the conviction, held that the regulation is ultra vires, because to have two barrooms without two bars is inconceivable, and the statute already provides against two bars. The judge further holds that the decisions previously given that the erection of a temporary structure in the hall did not make the hall a bar- room, and that there was no violation of either the regulation or the act.

WERE REFUSED

Ladies Hurt by Collapse of Stand at Queen's Park Will Have to Sue the City.

The application of the London Rolling Mills for continued exemption from taxation was again laid over by No. 1 committee of the city council at its meeting yesterday. The company is assessed for \$5,000 in place of the actual value of the plant, \$40,000.

The matter will now go to the council. Ald. Carson thought that the ex- emption should be continued.

Ald. Greenlee held the opposite view. The city solicitor's report said that the council could continue the ex- emption under the new assessment law if they wished.

The London Machine Tool Company were unanimously granted remission of \$1,500 in taxes on the burned por- tion of the property.

The matter of selling a strip of north Talbot street to Mr. Alex. Harvey was again laid over, pending discussion re- garding the proposed children's park.

The committee had no power to grant remission of taxes to John Meacham on a proposed new plant.

No action was taken in regard to the requests of Mrs. Arcsott and Mrs. Hicks for compensation for injuries re- sulting from the collapse of part of the platform in Queen's Park during the Old Boy celebration. Letters were re- ceived from the ladies' solicitors, but the committee were under the impres- sion that they had no claim for dam- ages.

Ald. Carson stated that he had heard the people ordered off the unlucky piece of platform several times before it collapsed.

A MUDDY SQUARE CAUSED PROTESTS

Comers to Market Did Not Like Its Condition—Prices Easier.

Farmers, farmers' wives and buyers are heard complaining about the slop- py state of the market square. Today mud was thick on all parts of the square. What makes people feel more like grumbling is the contrast presented on either side by King and Talbot streets, which now are being nicely paved.

"It seems strange," said one woman, "that these streets should be paved for the sake of the whole city, while the market square, where women have to walk, is in a disgraceful condition."

The hole in front of the big scales received the "benedictions" of men with loads of hay when it has been raining.

The size of the market was good, considering Friday night's rain, and the fact that it was the last day of Fair week. The market was about two-thirds the size of last Saturday's "bumper." Offerings were confined to the small lines, but qualities and prices were good.

Butter was just a shade easier than formerly. Pound rolls were going at 22 and 23 cents, while most of the crocks sold at 21 and 22 cents. It is to be noted that in the dairy hall but- ter sells at the same prices as down- town. Pound rolls were selling there at 25 cents.

Eggs were selling at 18 to 20 cents retail. It seems that Londoners are not getting many eggs as they were a couple of weeks ago, and prices are in- clined to be steady.

Lots of fine vegetables were offered. Potatoes sold at 65 and 75 cents a bag. Cauliflowers went for any- where between 50 cents and \$1 25 per dozen, cabbages at 40 cents, green corn at 7 cents and celery at 35 and 40 cents.

There was the usual quantity of poultry, and from 50 to 80 cents a pair was paid for dressed spring chickens. Twenty-five loads of oats appeared, and sold mostly at 95 cents per cwt.

As for fruit, well, there seems to be no end of it. Fifteen thousand bush- ets came into Western Ontario on a train from the Niagara district, having been collected at Hamilton. The market had its share. Peaches went for 40 and 15 cents a basket cheaper than last week. Pears were a trifle dull at 30 cents to \$1 25.

The petitioners wanted the courts con- tinued because they have been held for the past 40 years.
