FIENDISH ACTS ON THE L. & P. S. R.

Police of City and County Are Now Working on Case-Story of the Crime.

A flendish attempt was made on Saturday night to wreck Pere Marquette express No. 4, en route from Walkerville to London, and Michigan Central express, No. 136, southbound from London to St. Thomas.

Taggart, the insane murderer who scaped from Hamilton Asylum for the The Hustling and Efficient Secretary Criminally Insane with Private W. A Moir, the slayer of Col.-Sergt, Lloyd at Wolseley Barracks, and who has not yet been recaptured, is blamed for the crime, as he is thought to be in hiding in this vicinity.

#### The Attempts.

Both trains crashed into obstruc tions which had been placed on the Westminster station, about four miles south of the city.

Michigan Central express, which leaves London at 10:11 p.m. struck a heavy oak tie and carried i along about a mile and a half before the engineer was aware of the trouble The roadbed was torn up and had any heavy obstruction interfered with the tie a serious wreck would have been the result. As it was the tie shot along before the train and passed between the heavy planks on the roadway. At the next crossing south, however, it struck the planks square, tearing them out of the road and hurling them a considerable distance. This is said to be the first intimation the en-



The Canadian Associated Press cable received this morning adds that six other officers, including the medical health officer, presumably Dr. Winnett, are down with the disease. The other surgeon with the regiment is Dr. Goldsmith. Futher, the cable says that Col. Pellatt's secretary is also typhoidstricken. Mr. George I. Riddell, who looked after the Queen's Own reunion, went with the regiment as secretary to Sir Henry. One of the officers ill is Captain Arthur Kirkpatrick, but in all the cases it is said there are no complications. Captain Kirkpatrick's relatives here were notified of his ill-ness by cable a couple of days ago. Col. Sir Henry Pellatt, interviewed in London this morning, said that a week after the officers had dined with the Eighth Canadian Regiment at Quebec, some of the officers were taken slightly
