NEW TRIPLE ALLIANCE

Nipponese Newspaper View of Anglo-
Japanese Treaty.

Tokio, July 17. — The newspapers
here continue to discuss the new
Anglo-Japanese treaty, and while the
majority of the papers favor the new
alliance, still there are a few which
strongly condemn it.

The Government press is quietly
congratulating the Government on
the insertion of the treaty in
article IV, which practically excludes
the possibility of war between Japan
and America. This article was inserted
in order to diffuse the anxiety which
stood in the way of the ratification
of the Anglo-American arbitration
treaty, as the old treaty pro-
vided that in case of war Japan
and America should go to war.

By the new alliance Great Britain,
by its general arbitration treaty with
the United States, is precluded from
supporting Japan in a conflict with
the United States, and it is held in
most quarters that by this the spectre
of war between Japan and America
is removed.

The new situation, some of the
papers state, practically amounts to
a triple alliance between Great
Britain, Japan and the United States.
The minority press, on the other hand,
severely criticises the agreement as
being one-sided, and thus weakening
the position of Japan. The isolation
of Japan, say this section of the
papers, is complete and the United
States has greatly secured its position
in international politics.

THEFT OF BATHING SUITS

Loss to Port Stanley Man Is
Very Great and Arrests Will

Mr. John Howe, proprietor of the

tectives in regard to the theft of bath-
ing suits. Mr. Howe told the police
that his loss this year runs into a
very large sum, and he is determined
to stop the theft of suits no matter
what the cost. The police of St.
Thomas have also been notified, and
it is expected that some arrests will
follow shortly.

It is understood that the suits now
being used by Mr. Howe bear a spe-
cial mark, so that they can be easily
identified, and Sergeant of Detective
Nickel is of the opinion that it will
be comparatively easy to detect and
convict the thieves. Men are now
working on the case.

VETERAN FIREMEN

WILL GIVE A DRILL

Old Engine, "Phoenix," Will Be
Brought Here From Petrolia.

A meeting of the Veteran Firemen's
Association was held in the city hall last
night to complete arrangements for giv-
ing an exhibition fire drill during the Old
Boys' celebration.

It was decided to hold the annual parade
of the veterans, and the old "Phoenix"
will be brought from Petrolia to figure in
the display, and bring back to the present
generation and the visiting Old Boys and
Girls the exact picture of London's for-
mer fire brigade.

The veterans will carry banners bear-
ing the inscription, "Those That Are Left
of the Old Fire Brigade."

It was proposed to vary the exhibi-
tion at the fair grounds this year by
making a humorous show, in which the
veterans will extinguish a blaze in a spe-
cially built shack, and give a demonstra-
tion of "The Dark Town Fire Brigade at
Work."

This idea is most popular in some
quarters, and it is stated that several of
the veterans have declined to take any
part in the affair if a burlesque is to be
made of it. At last night's meeting
Richard McBride presided in the absence
of Mr. Walter Fairbairn, who is at present
in England.

WILL ASK MORGAN

TO TELL SECRETS

Steel Corporation Investigators
Are Going to Take a Trip
to New York.

Washington, July 18. — The Stanley
special committee, which is investi-
gating the United States Steel Cor-
poration, will go to New York July
27 to stay for several weeks. Hear-
ings will be held daily in that city,
and it is expected J. Pierpont Mor-
gan and other men of prominence
in the financial world will be called
as witnesses. Mr. Morgan is ex-
pected home from Europe about Aug.
1. Both the Democratic and Republi-
can steel probers are anxious to hear
what he has to say under oath con-
cerning the formation of the United
States Steel Corporation and the ab-
sorption of the Tennessee Coal and
Iron Company.

The committee had a long executive
session today and concluded that be-
fore going to New York it would hear
Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner
of corporations, whose report on the
Steel Corporation, compiled after sev-
eral years of investigation, was re-
cently published. It is also probable
the experts who did the actual work
of inquiry will also be called.

The steel committee today adopt-
ed a resolution directing F. H. Mc-
Rae, the committee's expert account-
ant, to proceed to Pittsburgh, to inspect
the books of the Steel Corporation,
with a view to determining the cost
of production of the various kinds of
steel products.

McRae is also directed to make a
particularly careful inquiry into the
ore rates on the Steel Corporation's
lines from the Mesabi and contiguous
ore fields to the Great Lakes, and from
the lakes to Pittsburgh. Some mem-
bers of the committee contend that
there is violation of the law by these
portations of ore for independent con-
sumption. It is contended that the in-
dependents through this unjust rate are
unable to compete with the cost of
ore used by the steel trust.
