WILL DISCUSS BYLAWS AT PUBLIC MEETING

Ingersoll Ratepayers to Vote Shortly on Three Important Money Grants.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ingersoll, July 11.—The three by-laws on which ratepayers will vote shortly will be discussed at a public meeting in the town hall on Friday night. Efforts are being put forth to have representative attendance of the electors and to bring about a full discussion of the measures. The by-laws are regarded as very important to the welfare of the town, and strong arguments will in all probability be advanced why the ratepayers should endorse them. Dr. Amyot, provincial bacteriologist, will be present in connection with the by-law.

OPEN VERDICT

Unknown Causes Blamed for Mysterious Death at Stratford.

SEIZED THE TAXI

Peculiar Case Over Vehicle That Came Across at Sarnia.

HELD FOR FORGERY

William Glanville in Custody Over Deal For New Buggy.
