STILL ENDEAVORING TO MISREPRESENT RICHTER

Enemies Try to Make Capital Out of Laborer's Wage Question.

The enemies of Ald. J. G. Richter, mayorally candidate, are continuing their campaign of slander and misrepresentation. The latest charge against the people's candidate is to the effect that he had declared on the occasion that \$1.25 per day was a sufficient wage for the laboring man.

"All rot," said Ald. Richter to The Advertiser today. "I have never made such a statement. I believe in giving every man a fair day's wage for a fair day's work, and the more work he does the more pay he should receive."

"I have always maintained," declared Ald. Richter, "that in civic business as well as any other, we should get a dollar's worth of work for a day's pay. If we are to go into charity, let's do it on other lines."

Street Railway Will Take 500 Horses-pow After First of Year.

The London Street Railway Company will not be using hydro alone for the operation of the system before the middle of February. No. 16 will still remain the same both in and out of London. No. 5 from the Falls will now be No. 15 to London, and out of here it will be known as No. 1. No. 3 remains the same.

1, due here at 12:28 p.m. from Toronto, will in future be known as No. 13.

A number of the local trains will also have their numbers changed in the course of a few days.

MANY PEOPLE BUY DISEASED POULTRY

M. H. O. Declares That Unfit Fowls Are Offered for Sale on Market.

London householders are buying diseased fowl in great numbers according to Dr. T. V. Hutchinson, medical health officer. Only this morning, Dr. Hutchinson received a complaint from a woman who purchased a turkey on the market and in preparing it for the oven, discovered signs which pointed to the turkey being affected with tuberculosis.

"When we run across these cases," said Dr. Hutchinson to The Advertiser, "we promptly confiscate the fowl, but the great difficulty is to find the owners and breeders. People buy poultry on the market and then do not know from whom they purchased it. Not until they open up the bird for cooking do they discover the symptoms of disease. That is why more prosecutions do not follow."

"Many people," continued the health officer, "pass over these symptoms and eat the fowl, some of them on the supposition that cooking destroys the power of the germs. But who wishes to eat disease germs even if the heat has destroyed their efficiency? It would be an almost impossible task to inspect all the poultry offered for sale on the market, as it is necessary to cut up the birds in order to detect the symptoms."
