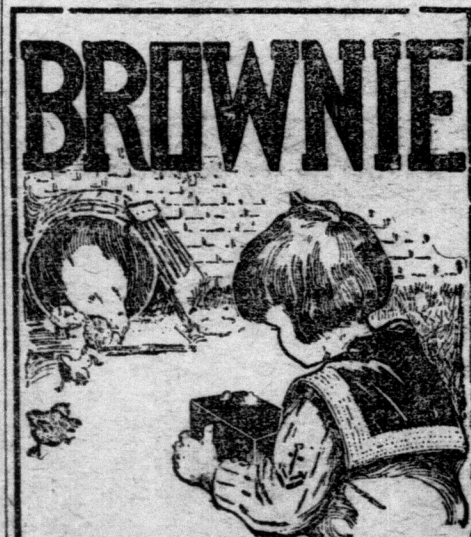

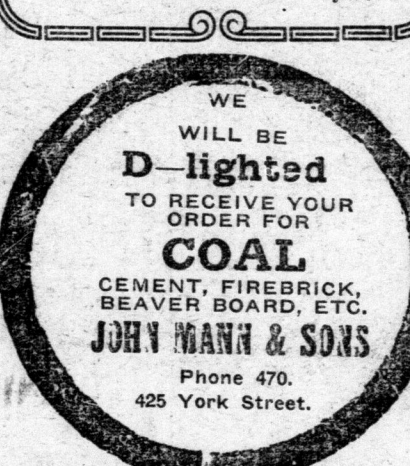

VALUABLE HORSES SAVED FROM DEATH IN EAST END FIRE

Nine Racers Rescued When the Stables of Queen's Park Hotel Are Badly Gutted.

CONDUCTOR SEES BLAZE

Turns in Fire Alarm That Brings Brigades to Scene—Cause Unknown.

Nine racehorses, belonging to William Collins, valued at about \$10,000, were saved just in time, when the barns of the Queen's Park Hotel, at Egerton and Dundas streets, were burned last night. Damage to the barns was \$1,000. They are owned by William Hill. The cause of the fire is not known.

Horses Led Out.
The horses were led out of the barn, which is at the rear of the hotel, on Dundas street, by five men who were in the bar, just before 11 o'clock. John Dodge, one of the rescuers, according to his story, took out three horses, and about two minutes later was ejected from the place by two policemen.

Valuable Animals.
The horses are: Major Kelly, Niagara Power, Annie McKinney, valued at \$1,600, a pacing mare; Miss Knight, On Wardo, a pacer and a horse brought yesterday from Mount Brydges, which Collins said was valued at \$2,000. The others were jumpers, names unknown.

Discovered by Conductor.
A street car conductor first saw the fire, a small flame, from the street. He sent in an alarm from Eva street. At almost the same time, other alarms were rung from the Grand Trunk roundhouse and from Egerton and Dundas streets. Firemen had to be sent to each different place.

Beside the barn where the horses were kept, a line of drisheds were also partly burned. They are covered by insurance, but Hill, the proprietor, was not sure last night, to what extent the barns were insured.

Y. W. C. A. GIRLS PRESENTED WITH NURSES CERTIFICATES

Col. Hodgins Praises Work of Women of St. John's Ambulance Corps.

Home nursing certificates were presented last night to the Y. W. C. A. branch of the St. John Ambulance Corps. More than fifty were present, and heard the addresses of Col. W. E. Hodgins, who made the presentations, and W. Love-day.

Colonel Hodgins praised the young women for their work in the association, and said that he had found it highly satisfactory.

The Y. W. C. A. branch of the corps is the only one to which women belong in the city. Many of them received certificates for first-aid work at the first of the year.

Altogether, there have been in this city about 120 examinations in first-aid work, including the examinations of the home nursing branch held last night.

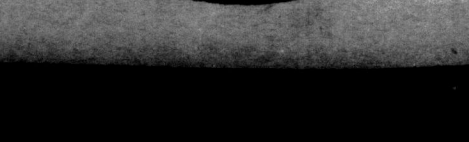

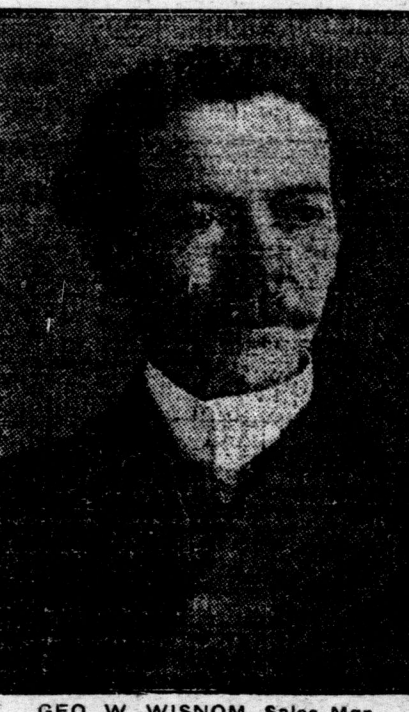

OVER 1,000 NEW CARS SOLD IN CITY THIS YEAR

Farmers Prove Good Customers for High-Priced Automobiles and Vans.

More than eleven hundred new automobiles have been sold in 1914 by London dealers, according to estimates by many of them, and by A. H. Koenig, secretary of the London and Western Motor Club. Between 140 and 160 cars were bought by Londoners, and are being used in London. Farmers are taking to the cars this year, just like ducks to water," said one dealer. "They show a liking for the higher priced ones, too, just as the citizens have done this year."

Most of the cars sold this season average about \$1,700. Doctors have invested in small cars for city visits. Dozens of trucks and light vans also, are selling rapidly.

According to most of the dealers, business having many deliveries, are beginning to look into the uses of the vans, which are so much speedier and more elegant in appearance than the horse and wagon.

"Despite the so-called money stringency all over the country, it is not shown by our sales. We have sold more cars this year than in any other year," said another dealer.
