Convoys of two army corps with 30 guns and ammunition and 5,000 prisoners are said to have been captured. The whole of the Austro-

There already are said to be a million Russians in Galicia, and half a million in East Prussia. While these numbers seem enormous, they are considered probably a fair estimate of what Russia will soon have available for beginning her war. It is said she will soon have 7,000,000 men on the move

While centinuing the offensive in Galicia, Russia is standing on the defensive on the Eastern frontier her army having been driven back by the Germans. This army, however, is said to be intact.


