RUSSIA TO HAVE 7,000,000 MOVING
Tremendous Army Ready To Fight Germans—Is On Defensive on East Frontier.
[Canadian Press.]
LONDON, Sept. 18.—Reports received from Petrograd today say that the Russian pursuit of the Austrians continues, and that the Russians have gained important success over the Austrians in rear guard. Convoys of two army corps with 30 guns and ammunition and 5,000 prisoners are said to have been captured. The whole of the Austro-Russian border between Yassov and Annapol is reported to be overrun by Cossacks, who are leading the Russian army.
The Russian army now in Galicia will be left there to complete its work, according to a Rome dispatch, an army of 900,000 Russians is marching into central Poland, followed by another army of 2,000,000, while a third army, also aggregating 2,000,000 strong, is coming from more distant regions and will reach the front in October.
There already are said to be a million Russians in Galicia, and half a million in Poland. While these numbers seem enormous, they are considered probably a fair estimate of what Russia will soon have available for beginning her war. It is said she will soon have 7,000,000 men on the move.
While continuing the offensive in Galicia, Russia is standing on the defensive in the Eastern frontier, her army having been driven back by the Germans. This army, however, is said to be intact.

Col. Lowther Is Among Wounded
LONDON, Sept. 18.—10:20 p.m.—The War Office has received from the army headquarters at the front, under date of Sept. 15, the names of twelve officers who were killed in the action at Ypres, and seven who are missing.
Col. B. H. Montross, of the Sussex Regiment, is among the missing. Col. H. C. Lowther, of the Scots Guards, is among the wounded.
Col. Lowther was formerly secretary to the Duke of Connaught, and shortly before leaving for the war was married to Miss Pelly, lady-in-waiting to the Duchess of Connaught.

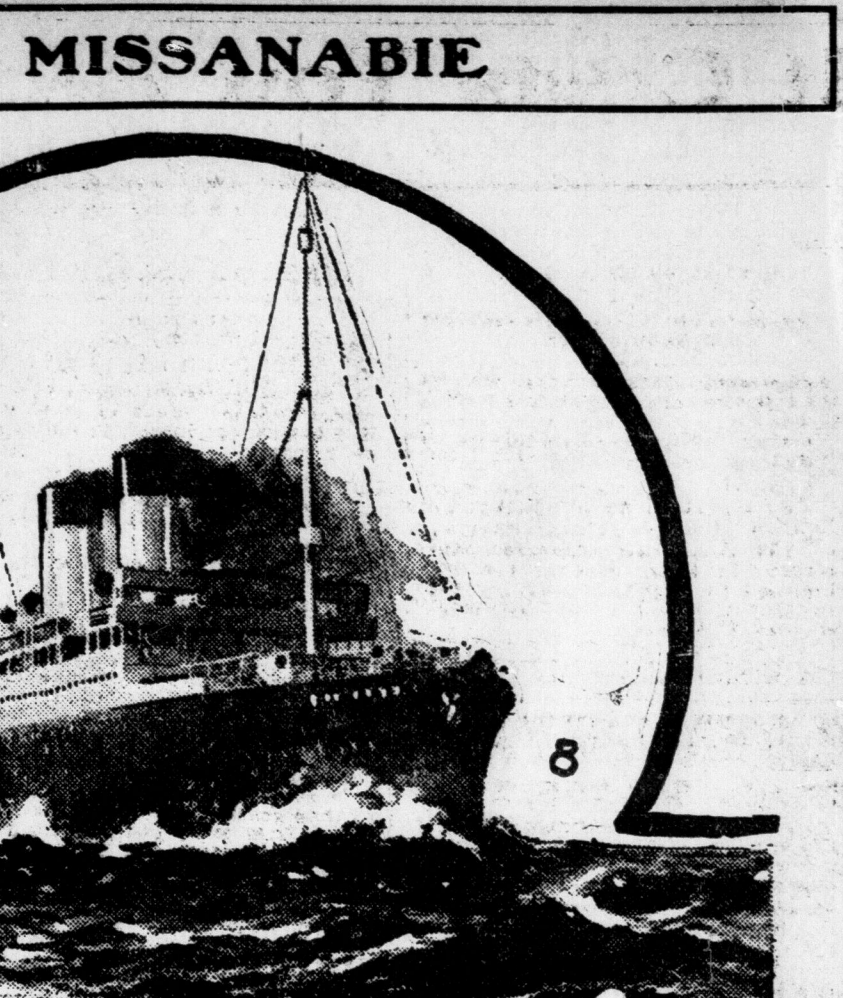
WAS ILL ONLY TWO WEEKS

THE MISSANABIE
When the twin-screw steamer Missanabie sails October 7 from Liverpool to Montreal, the Canadian Pacific Railway will have added to its fleet of steamships one that is the last word in ocean vessels from the standpoint of comfort, convenience, for the passengers, and strength and stability for navigation and capacity and appliances for cargo. The ship is 520 feet long, 64 feet broad and 41 feet deep. It has a gross tonnage of 12,000 tons, a displacement of 15,000 tons, and a cargo capacity of 40,000 cubic feet. Below the level of the main deck the space is devoted to general cargo, three being fitted for the carriage of refrigerated merchandise. From the main deck up, through no fewer than six separate decks, the entire space is devoted to passengers. There is room for 520 cabin passengers, berthed in large airy rooms, and for 1,200 third-class passengers, all in large rooms. Counting the crew of 300 the vessel is fitted to carry 2,020, or as many as the population of a small town.
Although a one-cabin boat, every effort has been made to make the appointments second to none, and the dining-room, smoking-room, card-room, drawing-room, lounge, cafe, gymnasium and other features of the most modern vessels are furnished and decorated in accordance with the plans of the best British architects and furnishers. The decoration is of the Georgian period. The hospitals and the culinary department are commodious and admirably designed for the work intended for each. The decks are expected to provide one of the chief features of the vessel, the promenade, sunbathing and other deck being designed to provide shelter, amusement, exercise or rest, according to the caprice of the passengers. German Goods, Even If Shipped From States, Will Be Confiscated

OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—It has come to the knowledge of the Government that a large number of circular letters are being sent to Canadian merchants by agents in the United States, offering to supply German and Austrian merchandise and goods at a discount. Hon. J. D. Ross, Minister of Trade and Commerce, said tonight that this was of course, an attempt to get around the proclamations prohibiting the importation of goods manufactured in the enemies' countries.
"Vigorous steps," he said, have been taken to see that all such goods sent to Canada would be confiscated and Canadian merchants were advised to have nothing to do with these commercial allies of Germany and Austria.
