Record holiday crowds that arrived on all trains from north, south, east and west, invaded London yesterday for the celebration of Victoria Day in this city. 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**FIFTEEN THOUSAND AT CAMP SPORTS ON CAMP HEIGHTS**

Some Crack Athletes Among 3,000 Soldiers Perform at the Barracks.

**TUG-OF-WAR A FEATURE**  
33rd Battalion Team Runs Away With All Its Competitors.

Ideal holiday weather brought a crowd of fifteen thousand people from London and parts of Western Ontario to Carling's Heights yesterday afternoon and made the big military field day most successful of its kind ever held in this part of the province. Among the 3,000 troops training on the Heights were some splendid athletes. There were numerous entries for every event and as a result every one was well contented to the great delight of the huge crowd which cheered and applauded enthusiastically.

The tug-of-war of the 33rd and 34th Battalions secured the bulk of the prizes, the 33rd being especially fortunate. The officers warmly congratulated the men upon the splendid spirit of fair play they showed throughout and the zest with which they entered into all the sports. The handsome prizes were presented at the close of the program by Mrs. Wilson, wife of the popular commander of the 33rd Battalion and here again the training the men are receiving was strikingly in evidence each man stepping smartly up to receive his prize, saluting and making way quickly for the next competitor.

**Applauds for Officer.**  
Lieut. Johnson who drilled the company which won the prize for being the best drilled on the Heights was given an ovation as he stepped up to receive the handsome silver cup and was called upon to respond. He replied briefly complimenting the men upon the efficiency they had displayed throughout.

"In the course of my work as instructor," he said, "I see a lot of good drilling, but I have never seen movements come through with greater precision."

"You can go all over Canada," said Lt.-Col. Wilson, "and nowhere could troops beat the work the company did."

A feature of the program was the tug-of-war, the handsome trophy being won by the 33rd Battalion team which successfully pulled the strong 34th Battalion team and then walked away with the prize. The C.M.R. team contested for wrestling on horseback was won by a team composed of Ptes. H. W. Smith, Morrow, Elliott, Barnard, Clavin, Bolton, and Wick of the 7th C.M.R.

The tug-of-war on horseback was won by "B" squadron team, composed of Ptes. Morin, Booth, Richards, Smith, Wakefield, and McDermid.
