AUSTRALIANS WON BIG VICTORY OVER TURKS' CRACK MEN

rman General Brought Out Army Corps-Lost Seven PARIS, May 24.—11:45 p.m.—News reagainst the British troops near Kaleh Tepe by two Turkish divisions was carefully prepared by General Liman Von Sanders, the German commander, and his staff, not only with the object of inflicting a check on the Allies, but with raising the spirits of the Turkish troops and reassuring public opinion which is said to have been profoundly

mpressed by the heavy Turkish losses at the beginning of May.

General Von Sanders brought up the 1st Army Corps, a crack organization, which had been reserved for the defence of Constantinople. Their landing was greatly hampered by the bombardment from the enemy's aeroplanes. Two divisions of this corps, which had been put ashore the night before at Maidos, imnediately marched to Kaleh Tene and attacked the Australians and New Zealanders the night of May 18-19. They were completely beaten, however, losing 2,000 men killed and 5,000 wounded, the

report says.

On the southern end of the peninsula the French troops faced strong defen-sive works. At certain points they advanced to within a few yards of the Turks, and fierce bayonet and hand grenade fighting followed.
