Meet at Chicago

Former Londoner Will Have
Charge of Race Revival in
Windy City.

Chris Fitzgerald, who has been appointed manager of the Chicago race meet, which opens on Saturday, July 15.

Fitzgerald, formerly an outfielder with the Giants, was released last week. Donlin is now managing and playing with the Long Beach team.

Pitcher Joe (Labate) Brown and Outfielder Pete Halsey have been given their unconditional release by Manager George Witte of the Senators.

"Tillie" Shafer, one-time Giant third baseman, is on his way back to New York, and may reconsider his determination to stay out of baseball and be seen shortly in a Giant uniform. Shafer was one of the fastest base runners in the game when he first broke in a few years ago. He hits from both sides of the plate, and his average always hovered around the .300 mark.

Martin Canale, the lightweight pugilist who fought Jimmy Britt for the championship in California thirteen years ago, is walking east over the California coast. He was arrested in Stockton, Cal., on a vagrancy charge. "I came to see the world in a hullion, but I am walking back on the heels," he said to the judge. "I could not stay in the ring with old John Barrymore."

Secretary John H. Farrell of the National Association of Professional Leagues announced that the franchise for the Lexington, Ky., ballpark, Ky., Charleston, W. Va., and Huntington, W. Va., teams have been forfeited to the Ohio State League.
