GAMES OF CHANCE
STOPPED AT PORT

Provincial Officers Take Joy
Out of Life For
Many.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 16.—The board
walk at the lakeside is in mourning.
Wreaths of crepe and purple bloom
hang in tearful numbers at the front
doors of the concessionaires. The pro-
vincial officers put the kibosh on the
more fascinating of the sports last
evening and ordered all games of
chance to cease. And this, too, in the
face of the crowds who will attend the
Irish picnic Wednesday afternoon.

Ring the peg was excused, but
the Derby races, the wheels of fortune
and any game which depended on a
chance result for the player was closed
up. The proprietors affected by the
sudden order to seek pastures new are
mad. The season has been a poor one
for the concessionaires, and on account
of the unusual hard times complained
of by every booth on the big white
way, no molestation was anticipated
from the provincial officers.

Magistrate is given
wider jurisdiction.

INGERSOLL, Aug. 16.—Police Mag-
istrate J. L. Patterson today received
notification from the attorney-general's
department of his appointment as mag-
istrate for the entire county of Ox-
ford, with the exception of Woodstock.
It is expected that courts will be held
at the more central places. The ap-
pointment means that justices of the
peace will have the power to take in-
formations, but not to try cases, with
the exception of those in connection
with local bylaws. Mr. Patterson was
appointed magistrate here in 1909.

GERMANY IS
DOING BEST
SAYS PREMIER

Military Burdens May Be Re-
duced by the Allies
Shortly.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Premier Lloyd
George, in his speech in the House of
Commons today concerning the last
meeting of the allied supreme council,
said a troublesome question was that
of the sanctions, or penalties, imposed
on Germany for non-compliance with
treaty terms. Germany was doing her
best in the matter of reparations, he
thought, and the allies felt that to pro-
long the irksome customs barrier on the
Rhine would be unfair, and it was thus
agreed to terminate them. With regard
to the military sanctions (the occupa-
tion of Ruhr region ports, etc.), the
French felt that some clauses of the
treaty had not yet been completely car-
ried out regarding disarmament, and
these sanctions would be retained for
some time longer. The matter, he said,
would come up at the next meeting of
the supreme council.

May Be Reduced.
There was a general feeling con-
tinued the prime minister, that the
time had come for the gradual reduc-
tion of the military burden imposed
upon Germany in the matter of occupa-
tion and control. The sooner Europe
was settled down to normal life, the
better. Mr. George said he appreciated
France's apprehensions of what might
ensue if Germany ever renewed her at-
tacks, but the real security of France,
he declared, depended upon three things.
The first was disarmament, upon which
Great Britain has always insisted. Ger-
many cannot build up great armaments
in secret, and the allies would be bound
to know about the attempt long before
it became a menace. The second, he
said, was the recollection by Germany
of the ruin the war, which she had in-
augurated, had wrought on her own
country, and the third was the knowl-
edge that whoever provoked war wan-
tonly brought the whole world upon the
aggressor and the greater the initial
success the greater in the end would
be the disaster for the aggressor.

All Must Help.
The prime minister announced that
the British trade agent in Moscow had
fully confirmed the gloomy nature of
the famine in Russia. He emphasized
that what was needed to cope with the catas-
trophe was some international effort,
and declared the surest means through
which the Soviet Government could re-
ceive outside aid would be to recognize
its obligation toward the foreign coun-
tries which had sent in their goods and
invested their capital to help Russia
if the past.

Mr. Lloyd George said that according
to dispatches received from Robert M.
Hodgeson, the British representative in
Moscow, thirty-five millions pounds
sterling would be required for the relief
of the masses of the people of whom
thirty per cent are children, moving
about in search of food. The premier
appealed to the Commons to set aside
prejudice. Nobody in Paris had tried
to make political capital out of Russia's
needs.

BIG REDUCTION IN BILL.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—A reduction
of \$99,330,000 in the annual tax bill of
the United States will result from the
changes in the 1918 revenue act en-
acted in the new administration tax
bill, Chairman Fordney of the ways and
means committee declared in a major
ity report filed today with the House.
