

Orphan Baby Has Time of Life When Adopted by Girl Students

Cheers Up Fair Co-Eds in Stillwater, Okla., College—Young Women Take Turns "Mothering" Infant, Whose Parents Died Shortly After She Was Deserted.

STILLWATER, Okla., Oct. 20.—"Oh, baby! Ain't it a grand and glorious feeling?" That, in substance, is probably what David, a 12-week-old baby boy, has been thinking ever since the opening of the fall term at the Oklahoma A. and M. college at Stillwater.

Before that time David's life was not ideal. Three weeks before he was born his father abandoned his girl-wife to get along as best she could. When David was but ten days old, after struggling hopelessly, the young mother died, leaving David alone in the world. He was then transferred to an orphanage, to wait for some kind-hearted person to come along and adopt him.

But now David, instead of being one of many in an orphanage, is the official baby of the A. and M. college, and as a whole flock of pretty girl students to mother him and to satisfy his wants before he even realizes what they are. For David has been adopted by the school of home economics of the college.

In the home-makers' cottage on the university campus, where the senior girls take turns in caring for David as a portion of the practical side of their training, David will probably be-

tain callers. Girls of all the under classes have been begging me every day for a chance to live in the cottage. We're going to have enough dresses soon to clothe a dozen babies."

Girls Are Willing.
Girl students not only are anxious to "mother" this orphan boy, but they're willing to support him, if necessary. If the state can't pay the expenses they'll see that the money is raised, they assert.

After all arrangements had been completed to adopt David for the period of the school year, it was found that there were no funds available to meet the expense. There wasn't an appropriation of money that could be used to buy clothes and a bed; there wasn't even money to pay David's transportation from Oklahoma City to Stillwater.

The girls of the School of Home Economics, however, were not discouraged by this little matter of finance; the state board of agriculture offered to apportion a special fund, but the girls insisted on taking care of it themselves. Members of Omicron Nu, a domestic science sorority, organized a "tag day" campaign, extending over two days; they "tagged" students, faculty members and Stillwater visitors, selling tags at 10 cents, and raised \$100 for the "David fund."

So a bed for the baby has been installed in the home-maker's cottage, a buggy and rattle were added to the equipment, and Miss Mary E. Baird, practice-house matron, was dispatched to Oklahoma City to bring the child. When he arrived all the girls of the Home Economics School were down at the train to meet him.

The new departure in instruction methods, too, has aroused interest among young mothers all over the state. Since first announcement was made that the work was to be given this year, scores of letters have been received in the department asking advice about the care of children. To meet this demand a correspondence course in child welfare work is being arranged.

A new \$120,000 building for the department was just completed before the opening of the fall term.

MEIGHEN AGAIN TAKES TARIFF AS HIS SUBJECT

Speaks To Two Audiences At
Sarnia Convention.

REFUTES CRERAR CHARGES

R. V. Lesueur Unanimous
Choice of Tories At Sarnia.

SARNIA, Oct. 20.—By staff correspondents Canadian Press.—Two large halls were necessary to accommodate the crowds which gathered here this evening to hear Premier Meighen and Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor, The Imperial Theatre, in which Premier Meighen spoke first, was crowded to the doors and the auditorium in the city hall was hardly of sufficient size to accommodate the overflow.

Mr. Meighen devoted his time at the tariff issue. At the overflow meeting he dealt with criticisms which had been aimed at the Government by Opposition speakers. He also voiced his condemnation of certain statements which he attributed to Mr. Crerar.

"I say to Mr. Crerar," he declared, "that when you stand on the public platform and say that I am the puppet of any man rich or poor, you say what you know is false." He defied Mr. Crerar to put his hand on any act which could form a basis for such "slandorous statements."

"We had almost enough of this," he concluded.

Senator Robertson expressed the opinion that the maintaining of a protective tariff was of prime importance to Canadian labor. He recounted the achievements of the Government on behalf of labor.

Joseph E. Armstrong, Liberal Conservative candidate in East Lambton, also spoke.

In City Hall.
The big auditorium in the city hall building was filled to capacity with delegates and others assembled for the selection of a candidate. The Progressives have already nominated R. J. White as their candidate, while F. E. Pardee, who represented West Lambton in the last Parliament, will carry the Liberal standard.

Five names were placed before the convention for nomination, as follows: R. V. Lesueur, P. T. McGibbons, Mrs. W. J. Hanna, R. E. Lesueur and Lyall Lesueur, all of Sarnia.

All of the nominees, with the exception of R. V. Lesueur, withdrew, leaving him the nominee of the party. His nomination was made unanimous.

In declining to stand for nomination, Mrs. Hanna said that she felt that the convention was thinking of her husband in nominating her. She stated that the present Government has honored women in giving them the vote and that women should respond by doing their utmost to fit themselves for the franchise.

Mr. Lesueur, addressing the convention, emphasized his absolute faith in Premier Meighen.

The Tariff Issue.
Mr. Meighen said he proposed to discuss the tariff issue at the main meeting. At the overflow meeting he would deal with charges that had been leveled at the Government by opposition speakers.

"How long would you be in Sarnia if we leveled the tariff wall?" he queried his hearers. "Where would Canada be with her population of nine millions lying beside the industrial colossus of the world if we had free trade? Is there any mind so stupid as to most rudimentary logic which can argue that Canada could maintain and develop her industrial life under such competition as that?"

He went on to declare that the fate of Canada under free trade would be mere commercial vassalage to the United States. To lay our tariff down meant the absorption of our industries one after another and the aggrandizement of the United States.

"Mr. Crerar proposed to do away with protection by easy stages," said the premier. "He declares that protection is morally and commercially wrong, but he wants to hang on to it for a while."

The platform of the Progressives had been revised this year, he declared, and therefore, it was safe to assume that it was still correct. The revision had consisted in adding one word. Instead of promising to do away with patronage, as in the original platform, Mr. Crerar now declared for abolition of "the evils of patronage."

Mr. Crerar's policy would be fatal to industries such as those operating in Sarnia, said the premier. The tariff platform subscribed to by Mackenzie King and F. E. Pardee was almost a

photographic reproduction of the Crerar platform.

Mr. Pardee declared that he would do nothing to injure his native city, said the premier, but if that was true, why was he running on this free trade platform which was bound to injure Sarnia? Mr. King would not repudiate his platform. "You can no more get him to repudiate his platform than you can get him to declare that he will carry it out," said the premier. "I've been trying for a year to do it without success."

"Every man from a baby to a man a hundred years old is either a producer or a consumer, or both," said the premier in criticizing Mr. King's declaration for a tariff for the producer and consumer. Mr. King was pursuing a policy of evasion in discussing tariff matters, he said.

ANNUAL CONVENTION OF DISCIPLES OF CHRIST

RODNEY, Oct. 20.—The convention of the Western District of the Disciples of Christ was held at Rodney on Tuesday, all the churches in the district being represented. Alex. Purcell of Rodney, president of the convention,

occupied the chair. Reports of churches were given by the delegates, showing a steady growth in numbers and interest. At the conclusion Dr. Fowler of Ridgeway gave an interesting summary and spoke on the necessity of individual effort. Luncheon was served by the ladies of the Rodney Church in the commodious basement of their up-to-date new building. After luncheon Mrs. Frank of Aylmer opened the meeting with devotional exercises, after which Mrs. C. B. King of London gave an interesting account of the proceedings at the international convention of the Disciples held at Winona Lake, where there were over 7,000 in attendance.

The Rodney choir furnished music between the addresses.

A pleasing effect was given at the opening session in the evening by the large chorus comprised of the singers of the various churches in the district under the leadership of J. B. Ferguson.

A. McKillop, president of the provincial board, outlined the aims and

the present condition of the Forward Movement fund of the Disciples.

Traverse Harrison then gave the convention a sermon on the subject of "Christian Education," emphasizing the need of Bible study, organization and personal effort to make the work successful. Mr. Harrison is one of the best platform speakers in the north-west.

At this time, Mrs. Remig of Winipeg, the field secretary for women's

work of all Canada, arrived, to the delight of the large audience, as she had been delayed by faulty train connections. Although the hour was late she held the attention of the large audience by outlining the plan for closer relationships in the inter-provincial work.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, E. Rowe, St. Thomas; vice-president, W. F. Farnham; secretary-treasurer, Miss Myrtle Fowler, Rodney.

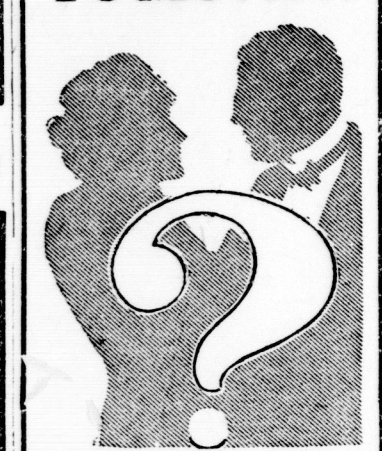

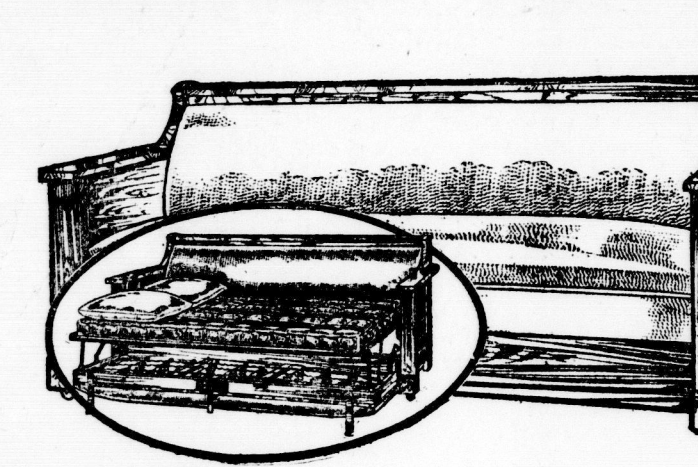
