Toronto July 10 - Hon. W. E. all legal proceedings against the Labatt Brewing Company of London, charged with the transportation of beer through the city streets, contrary to the provisions of the Ontario temperance act.



It was therefore felt that they could afford to pay for their substitutes themselves out of the double salary received.

In the meantime, those substitute teachers who read the report of Chairman Smith's acries were peeved at the possibility of "pay day" being postponed.
