

WOULD APPOINT ADVISORY BODY

Professor Morrow Suggests
Chamber of Commerce
Heads Be Included.

Thinks Business Course Will
Be Finest in Any
School.

Received with much favor at the Chamber of Commerce noon meeting in the Tecumseh House Thursday was the suggestion from Professor E. H. Morrow of the staff of the Western University, that the presidents of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Western Ontario be appointed to act as an advisory board in matters pertaining to the teaching of commerce at Western University.

The aid of businessmen of the city as an all-important factor in conducting the department of commerce at Western University with a view to developing the student along practical lines, and giving him insight into the problems presented by the business world, was given strong emphasis by Professor Morrow in his address.

Furthermore, in outlining the courses of study which he followed, he indicated clearly that the classes in commerce might be of as much value to the businessman of the city as to the student enrolled.

"To the end that we may turn out trained executive men, with a knowledge of the problems and facts of the business world," Prof. Morrow said. "We shall ask that businessmen of the city devote a small space of time to the discussion of their particular line of commerce or trade with the classes, present their problems and leave the class to consider and discuss them and the discovery of a possible solution."

"We have not the intention of giving a specialized technical training along any one particular line. That may be done by business courses, or better still, from business experience. Our aim rather is to get away from theorizing and turn out students who have the capabilities of good businessmen and executives."

Coming into Prof. Morrow's address, Dean Steward of Western University, advanced the statement that at the present time, the course in commerce given at Western University ranks equal, and in some cases, better than that given at the other Canadian colleges, and that given time for full development, it will rank with the finest schools of commerce on the continent.

The plan followed in the teaching of commerce at Western will be, it was stated, very similar to that followed at Harvard University, which acknowledged as foremost authority in the training of commerce and business management.

IS SENTENCED ON FORGERY CHARGE

Duncan Black Gets From
Three Months to Two Years
in Reformatory.

Duncan Black, a middle-aged farmer, of South Dorchester, was sentenced to not less than three months, and not more than two years, less one day, in the Ontario Reformatory, after pleading guilty to a charge of forgery in police court this morning. He admitted forging the name of Levi Willis to a promissory note. The note was cashed at the Home Bank, about \$500 being obtained on it.

"Have you anything to say as to why I should not impose sentence on you?" asked Magistrate Graydon. "Well, I expected to get \$250 this morning, and I could get another \$250 if I got out, and make it good," replied Black.

"The crime you have committed is a very serious one. I have always looked upon it as a very cowardly one. A robber who enters a place takes a chance on physical injury and the possibility of being shot to death, but there is no risk in that regard in this offense. This offense is regarded as serious, because business has to depend on signatures. If it was allowed to go on, business would not go on."

On behalf of the prisoner, Ashton R. Douglas, his counsel, asked for leniency, stating his client was suffering from an open wound in his side and was in very poor condition physically.

Magistrate Graydon could not see why the man's condition should deter him from sending him to an institution, as he would be given medical attention there, he pointed out.

HAS MANY APPLICATIONS FOR DOMESTIC SERVANTS

Salvation Army Hostel Reports Big
Demand for Maids From
England.

So great is the demand for capable domestic servants in the city that the Salvation Army Immigration Hostel, "Midfield Lodge," at the corner of King and Ontario streets, has continually a long list of applications on hand.

A party of girls from England, who come to Canada with the intention of seeking employment in domestic service, is expected to arrive at the end of the week, and applications are already in for their services, with the demand expected to exceed the supply.

The last party came two weeks ago, five girls and a widow with three children. All were found positions, and are reported as going on well satisfied with Canada as a whole and their new homes in particular.

CONTENTED WITH POLICE SYSTEM

Mayor Disapproves of Putting
Commission Under
Municipal Control.

Unlike civic administrators in St. Thomas and other Ontario municipalities, who are urging government legislation to place the police commission under municipal control, Mayor Wilson disapproves of the present procedure, the "old-fashioned way," as he terms it.

At this moment the London Police Commission consists of Mayor Cameron Wilson (chairman), Police Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon, Judge Talbot Macbeth, Chief of Police Robert Birrell and secretary.

There is a noticeable movement in other communities to change this arrangement in such a manner as to place the commission directly responsible to the people. In short, there are those who state with growing emphasis that the police commission, as a public spending body, should be elected by the ratepayers who have to shoulder the expense.

Mayor Wilson is decidedly against this plan, and infers that the proposal would receive no favor while he occupies the mayor's chair.

"I would not desire that the police commission should be made into a political affair," he declared Thursday.

"We have two good members," he added, "in the person of the police magistrate and the county judge. They are entirely competent as commissioners, and I can say that anything that I have had to suggest has always been received with very consideration. Of course, the mayor may be a fool, but he changes from year to year, in any event."

PICK CANDIDATES IN OPEN MEETING

Labor Organization Decide to
Select No Representatives
Behind Closed Doors.

Aspirants for civic honors in December next must receive their nomination in public convention at the Labor Temple, if they choose to face the voters on a straight labor ticket. This is the ruling from labor headquarters.

Representative members of the political labor movement give assurance that, everything will be conducted in the open, and there will be no selection of nominees at special sessions behind closed doors.

Plans for the forthcoming contest will be prepared at special sessions of the London Labor Party and No. 1 branch of the organization, throughout the month.

Prominent labor men believe at this moment that there will be a labor candidate in the mayoralty field, as it is their determination that no municipal honor shall go by default. It is proposed that suitable candidates be placed in the aldermanic race in greater numbers than at any previous election, while a special effort will be made to elect a full representation to the school board.

URGES CAMPAIGN ON ANNEX TAXES

Ald. Ashplant Plans to Lay
the School Question Before
Ratepayers.

Will Hold Meeting to Advise
Electors on Issue.

The annexed school question is by no means a dead issue, according to Ald. Henry B. Ashplant, who explained Thursday that arrangements are practically complete for a series of public mass meetings, at which qualified speakers will address the electors in that respect.

It is proposed that a meeting should be held in the downtown area, at which may attend all citizens interested in this issue, which created such dissension in the city council earlier in the year, and was terminated only after the question had been sent to the court of revision and two labor aldermen had been voted out of the London Labor Party. Ald. Fred R. Watkinson and Ald. John Ashton.

Although their colleagues, Ald. Ashplant pressed for the collection of certain additional school taxes from industries in the annexed districts of East London, the latter did not support him, and Ald. Ashplant's efforts drew the assistance of one lone councillor Ald. (Dr.) Leonard Douglass.

The court of revision has said that the issue should claim the attention of a higher judiciary, and Ald. Ashplant proposes that a campaign be instituted by ratepayers to compel the city council to pursue this question to a logical conclusion, by a writ of mandamus.

Other public meetings will be staged from time to time throughout the annexed district, it is explained, where interest in the school tax issue has by no means abated, if all reports are correct.

LIBERALS PROMISE GREAT ACTIVITIES

Program for Year To Be Announced
at Opening of
Club.

Liberal activities in London during the fall and winter season are already showing signs of outliving those of other years, C. C. Ferguson, secretary of the Liberal Club, announced Thursday morning.

The program for the present season will be introduced for the sanction of the members at the opening meeting of the season to be held in Hyman Hall at 8 o'clock Friday night.

Preparations are being made to accommodate a number of the largest crowds in the history of the club, as the season's program is said to be the most extensive and interesting ever attempted by the London organization, and Secretary Ferguson is confident that that alone is sufficient to draw out every member of the club.

Dr. A. B. Rankin, a prominent Liberal of this city, will address an assemblage on "Organization," and among several added features on the program is a vocal solo by F. S. Ashplant.

It is the intention of the executive to inaugurate a vigorous campaign for new members at an early date. Although the membership at the present is extremely large, the officers of the club are of the opinion that there is always room for one more. Plans for the campaign will be formed at a subsequent meeting.

"What are you in for?" asked an official of one of the boys, shortly after he was taken into custody. "Highway robbery," the boy said with a smile, as he was taken back to the shelter.

NOT ADVISED OF WEIR BEING "BOSS"

Miss Radcliffe Declares
Forces Evenly Divided
Until Order Received.

Once the school trustees have ruled once and for all that Dr. George S. Weir is "chief" attendance officer, as has been reported unofficially recently, it is the first that Miss Dallas Radcliffe has heard in connection with it, she declared Thursday morning.

Miss Radcliffe was employed by the school board at the commencement of the fall term, and was directed to work in connection with the increased duties occasioned by the rigid enforcement of the adolescent school attendance act. "I have heard nothing, however, the point was raised for general discussion as to who might be designated as the 'chief' attendance officer."

The issue was argued back and forth for several days, developing into a general free-for-all discussion, until finally Dr. Weir brought the affair to the authorities for a "showdown." The trustees in general session expressed reluctance to deal with the problem, and delegated the task to a special "star chamber" committee.

While it was subsequently reported that Dr. Weir was still the chief and Miss Radcliffe an assistant, Miss Radcliffe stated most emphatically Thursday that "she had heard nothing about it, and as far as she was aware the forces were about evenly divided, in their opinion."

BLAMES CONGESTION AT MAIN CORNER ON CITIZENS

While there has been considerable criticism and abuse directed at the police force respecting traffic direction at the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets, Ald. Dr. Douglass holds that a great portion of the burden of responsibility rests upon the citizens, both drivers and pedestrians.

He points out that they do not seem to want to wait for even a fraction of a second in order to allow the traffic officer to direct movements with the slightest degree of satisfaction. All traffic should be compelled to wait until the constable gives the signal, as in other communities, he declares, and would include the walking public as well.

HERE WE HAVE ITEMS OF LOCAL AND DISTRICT INTEREST AS RECORDED IN THE ADVERTISER OF 1897.

OCTOBER 5, 1897. Weather mostly fair and warm. The council met last night, and in the absence of Mayor Little, Ald. Parnell was unanimously voted to the chair, and due to a force of habit was invariably addressed as "his worship" by the members. The liveliest discussion of the evening sprang from the report of the jubilee committee. The financial clause stated that the committee's total receipts, exclusive of the \$250 obtained to pay current expenses by certain members discounting their promises for notes for that amount, were \$2,017.79, and the total disbursements were \$725.70, leaving a balance of \$1,292.09, which the committee apportioned by paying Mr. Roselle Peacock \$100 for musical services, \$1,000 to the Victoria Jubilee Hospital Com-

pany, and \$192.09 to the special fund being raised for the erection of a children's pavilion in connection with the proposed new hospital.

Mr. Orvie St. John, son of Rev. W. E. Scott of Ridgeway, has passed a successful entrance examination at Berkeley Divinity College, Middletown, Connecticut, and was awarded a classical scholarship with \$125.

CHARGE WILSON BETRAYS LABOR

Trades and Labor Council In-
censed At One-Man Car
Approval.

Members Select Committee
To Convey Sentiments To
City Council.

Charging point-blank that Mayor Cameron Wilson has betrayed the common people, delegates in attendance at the regular session of the trades and labor council Wednesday night moved to co-operate with street railway employees in a formal protest against the inauguration in London of one-man cars.

By a majority vote a strong committee was selected to act with a similar deputation from the street railwaymen's union, and the members of both groups will present their views at the next council meeting.

"It is just a question, to my mind, whether there would be any use for this council to take up the question of one-man cars with Mayor Wilson and the city council," declared ex-Ald. John Colbert, president of the street railwaymen's union, in addressing the subject at the direction of the members of that organization.

"Mayor Wilson has betrayed labor," continued the former councillor. "I don't know whether there will be any use if we do go to the council about this matter. Never once this year has any visit to the council by labor's representatives resulted in anything."

Granted Permission.

"You are well aware that the city council several weeks ago granted the street railway company permission to operate five one-man cars in this city."

"Going further back, you will remember that at the first of the year the company moved to reduce wages. At the same time application was made to the provincial legislature for an increase of the minimum wage."

"The city sent Mayor Wilson and certain aldermen to Toronto to oppose this bill, but it passed eventually. Subsequently I was in Toronto when the minister of labor, Hon. Walter Rolfe, told me that he had advised Mayor Wilson that the bill would pass and that it behooved him to return to London and see what he could do to obtain consideration from the council for the citizens at large and the company employees."

"Then Mayor Wilson came back and said that the government were playing a 'put-and-take' game. He got away with that apparently and then gives the company permission to operate one-man cars without demanding any consideration for the people. This one-man car scheme will mean in addition to the danger and inconvenience placed upon the citizens, the release of fifteen men. I claim that it is up to us to get into the political labor movement and elect a new mayor next December."

Charges Junketing Trip.

"I understand," commented Delegate Ballard, "that the mayor and council are now going down to Windsor on another 'junketing' trip at the city's expense to view these cars. What is the idea of that after they have granted permission? I understand that certain of the council are actually opposed to the scheme."

"You are wrong about that," interrupted Alderman John Ashton, "none of the council went to Windsor, although I understand that they are going, but I have not heard when I wish to state furthermore that the one-man car project did not pass the council without opposition. The vote was 6 to 4."

"I never thought that the question was coming up. When President Currie of the Street Railway Company came to the council he 'sprung the one-man proposal.'"

Questioned by Delegate Colbert, Ald. Ashton replied that none of the city council demanded any consideration from President Currie.

"They just sat there and said nothing," he said. "I moved that it be referred back to the committee, but my proposition was voted down."

The following committee was appointed to assist with the union in a formal protest to the council: Delegates Donald Wright, Arthur Mould and J. Liddell.

JUDGMENT WAS reserved in the case of Arthur and Edith Link versus Martin and Jeanette and Harry Edson, an action for \$475, by Judge Talbot Macbeth in the county court this morning. The plaintiffs claimed a motor car had been misrepresented to them by the defendants. When Myrtle Wilkinson abandoned her claim to an auto, which she claimed Arthur Shaw had wrongfully seized, and asked the court to decide who should pay the costs, Judge Macbeth ordered her to pay. When the suit was entered, she claimed the car was her property.

SEEK WAY TO GET MEMORIAL FUNDS

Executive of Army and Navy
Veterans Meets to Discuss
Means.

Enthusiasm over the project of a war memorial for the city of London to honor the memory of those who died in the conflict of 1914, was more than manifested at a special executive meeting of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association, held Wednesday night, at which suitable methods of raising funds for the purpose were discussed.

Although the meeting was an executive one, a large number of the members were present, and secretary J. A. Glennie expressed himself with being more than pleased at the interest displayed by all the veterans in the city.

The site for the proposed memorial has not been selected as yet, but the committee has in view several locations in the central part of the city upon which the monument could be erected to advantage.

Aware of the fact that almost every city and town in the Dominion had a suitable memorial to their fallen heroes and feeling that London, a city of more than 60,000, which moreover is a military center, make special efforts to honor the boys from the Forest City who gave their lives in France.

The Army and Navy Veterans decided some time ago that a memorial would be erected if that organization had to finance the scheme alone. Since that time, however, the returned men as a whole have become enthusiastic over the scheme, and have pledged their support almost to a man.

It is the intention of Mr. Glennie to call a mass meeting of all the ex-service men regardless of the fact whether they belong to a soldiers' organization or not, in the near future, when the project will be discussed from every angle.

It has not been decided what form the memorial will take, but if the generosity of the veterans warrants it it will probably be similar to the one in Victoria Park erected to the memory of the heroes of the South African war.

STEWART TAKES BAD TURN.
