CITY'S YOUNGEST CHURCH
MAKES GREAT PROGRESS

Grace Church on Hamilton
 Road Started in Year
 1920.

FEW IN DISTRICT

Parish in Last Few Years Has
 Developed in Splendid
 Manner.

Grace Church on the Hamilton road
 is the youngest church of London
 Methodist.
 Its work commenced in the spring
 of 1920. The Methodist council of
 the city, together with the chair-
 man of the district, the late Rev. W.
 J. Ashton, made a survey of the
 suburban districts of the city to see
 in what locality a new church was
 most needed.
 Calling attention to them as in need
 of a house of worship. At the same
 time, the city was undertaking
 through its housing commission, the
 development of the Pine Lawn dis-
 trict, which is on the south side of
 the Hamilton road, opposite the Eal-
 ing district.

A splendid site for a church was
 secured on the corner of Glenwood
 avenue and Hamilton road. At that
 time there were but very few houses
 east or south of the Ealing public
 school. Ample proof was soon evi-
 dent of the power of the church in
 developing the district. Now there
 are scores of homes in the district,
 occupied by their owners, a whole
 section, speaking loudly in support
 of London's boast that 85 per cent
 of her citizens own their own homes.
 The original idea was to erect a
 Sunday school building, which would
 answer for public worship at the
 present time. Under the leadership
 of William Heaman, president of the
 council, and Rev. J. A. Agnew, chair-
 man of the district, money was
 secured and the building erected,
 built for, and dedicated in October,
 1922.

Placed in Charge.

A. R. Stone, a probationer for the
 Methodist ministry, was placed in
 charge. He gathered together a
 number of children and a Sunday
 school was organized. The few
 Methodists of the district became
 charter members of the new church.
 The choosing of a name became an
 issue at this point and it was decided
 to call the new organization "Grace
 Church."
 A trustee board was formed of the
 following men: R. L. Watson,
 John Walker, John G. Richter, Henry
 Pocock, William Heaman, William
 Comp, W. C. Benson and W. P.
 Young. Mr. Benson was elected
 secretary of the Young people's
 society.
 At the conference of 1923, Rev. G.
 W. Dewey was stationed at Grace
 Church. A parsonage was secured at
 174 East street.

Under Mr. Dewey's pastorate the
 church has been steadily increasing.
 The report of the Grace Methodist
 Church was a surprise and gratifica-
 tion to the entire district at the
 recent meeting, and the "baby
 church" received the congratulations
 of all. Mr. Dewey himself is well
 known in the city, having served
 twice previously as the pastor of
 Emory Avenue Methodist Church.
 The work of the church is ex-
 perience splendid progress under
 the superintendence of Edward
 Banks, a son of the church, secre-
 tary, Leslie Williams the librarian,
 and Miss Pearl Copeland the pianist.

Splendid Impetus.

A splendid impetus to the work
 of the whole congregation has been
 given by the Ladies Aid Society.
 They made excellent contributions
 last year to the general expenses of
 the church, as well as undertaking
 a large share of the responsibility
 for the carrying on of the work. Mrs.
 Duery is the president, Mrs. Banks
 the secretary, and Miss Skelhorn the
 treasurer.

The congregation of Grace Church

lost no time in organizing their own
 choir. A. C. C. Benson is the leader,
 and the choral music now is an im-
 portant adjunct to the services each
 Sunday. An orchestra has also been
 organized in connection with the
 Sunday school, and this is in at-
 tendance at each Sunday evening
 service.

Already the Sunday school of

Grace Church is taking its accom-
 modation. An extension is being
 seriously considered. The church it-
 self is able to capacity on the oc-
 casions of all evening services.

Grace Church has a splendid future,

and is continuing to progress and
 develop in the future. It is situated
 in a fine location, and it is a source
 of extreme satisfaction to Methodism
 of the city.

BODY OF MISSING BOY

FOUND NEAR SOMBR
 Fifteen-Year-Old Thomas Sel-
 man Discovered in St.
 Clair River.

Sarnia, May 30.—The body of
 Thomas Selman, 15-year-old son of
 Thomas Selman, white line of Sonora
 Township, was found in the St. Clair
 River today near the village of
 Sombra. The boy disappeared from
 home on January 11. He is believed
 to have played on ice floes and fallen
 into the water. Captain Thomas
 Whitely and Christopher Whaley made
 the discovery.

The boy's father identified the body

by the clothing. The corpse was de-
 composed badly from long immersion
 in the water, and the clothing was
 covered with river mud. No inquest
 will be held.

PARIS BOARD OF HEALTH

HAS ILLUSTRATED LECTURE

 health had a lecture, illustrated by
 the famous artist, in the Community
 Hall, Thursday evening. Dr. Mc-
 Clennan of the provincial department
 of health spoke briefly. An interest-
 ing address was given by Dr. Mid-
 dieton, medical inspector of the pro-
 vincial board of health and head of
 the department of health.

On Thursday afternoon Dr. Mc-

Clennan addressed the senior pupils
 of the Central school and Central
 annex.

BELAND DEFEATS
D.S.C.R. ATTACKS

Department Declared Unsym-
 pathetic Toward Applicants
 For Treatment.

COMPLAINTS FEW

Canadian Press Despatch.
 Ottawa, May 30.—The House of
 Commons made fair progress today in
 committee of supply. Estimates of
 the department of soldiers' civil re-
 establishment were before the com-
 mittee. Criticism, chiefly from Con-
 servative members, was based on the
 claim that applications for treatment
 and pension did not always receive
 the sympathetic treatment at the
 hands of department officials which
 they merited. Specific cases were
 cited in support of this contention.
 Opposition members also repeated the
 charge, made when these estimates
 first came up, that the department
 was overstaffed.

To the criticism of lack of sym-
 pathy, Hon. H. S. Beland, minister
 of the department, replied that the
 cases cited were but a very small
 proportion of the 167,000 which came
 up for review year after year by the
 pensions board.
 The charge that the department was
 over-staffed the minister answered
 by pointing to reductions from 8,000
 to 2,800 employees in three years.
 Though there was a reduction in the
 number of patients, there was no
 diminution in applications for treat-
 ment. "If a man comes knocking at
 the door you can't turn him away
 without examination," he said. Ex-
 aminations and classification entailed
 labor.

When the committee rose all the
 estimates of this department had been
 passed with the exception of an ap-
 propriation of \$150,000 for the federal
 appeal board. Estimates approved to-
 day totalled \$9,418,000.

Discuss Grant.

Discussion was continued on the
 vote of \$2,600,000 for care of patients
 and medical examination of pen-
 sioners. Hon. H. S. Beland stated
 that it was the intention of the de-
 partment to return to its owners
 Mowat Hospital at Kingston. The
 government had the option of doing
 this any time after the lapse of five
 years.

General Ross (Conservative, King-
 ston) took up the case of tubercular
 soldiers. While the country experi-
 enced at the second battle of Ypres
 had little to do with tuberculosis, he
 said the effect of the gas later in
 life was frequently very severe, and
 many today were suffering from it.
 Many of the men known to be suffer-
 ing through the weakening of the
 lungs had been a result of gas, and
 although not having tuberculosis,
 should receive treatment from the
 D. S. C. R.

General Ross urged the government
 to consider seriously the maintenance
 of the Mowat Hospital for tubercular
 cases in Kingston.
 There was a lack of sympathy and
 interest in cases which were brought
 to the attention of the department,
 said General Ross, and some of them
 were only dealt with as a result of
 pressure. He suggested that the de-
 partment speed up correspondence in
 connection with cases, that it have
 diagnoses made quickly and that
 it take a real interest in the cases com-
 ing to its attention.

Asks Co-operation.

J. T. Shaw (Independent, West Cal-
 gary) referred to a specific case and
 gave an illustration of the lack of
 co-operation between the various
 bodies concerned in dealing
 with soldiers' problems.
 Mr. Murray MacLachlan (Conservative,
 St. John) instanced the appointment
 of a man who was not a medical doctor
 to the position of superintendent of
 St. Anne de Bellevue Hospital.
 "This policy of appointing 'laymen'"
 to administrative positions of this
 kind was causing a great deal of
 trouble among the medical profession in
 Canada.

Hon. R. J. Manion (Conservative,
 Fort William) spoke of the wide-
 spread impression that the adminis-
 trative branch of the department was
 over-staffed. Last year the D.S.C.R.
 spent \$12,415,933 of which over two-
 thirds was for salaries and adminis-
 tration, and only one-third paid out
 to soldiers.

Dr. Beland replied that the cases
 cited by some members of the House
 were, after all, a very small propor-
 tion of the 167,000 cases which had
 to be reviewed year after year, and
 most of which were satisfactorily
 dealt with by the commissioners. The
 medical board of nine, chosen by the
 board of pensions commissioners, were
 not under his jurisdiction and their
 decisions not under his review. Of
 the doctors who were within his
 jurisdiction in every part of Canada
 he had the highest possible opinion.

Speaking of the reduction in staff
 the minister said that he cut 2,000
 from the department within two years
 and three months took considerable
 courage.

STROKE PROVES FATAL

TO MRS. D. J. HUGHES

St. Thomas Loses Leader in

Many Philanthropic
 Activities.

 Hughes, widow of the late Judge D.
 J. Hughes, who for years had been
 at the head of the local council of
 women, passed away this afternoon
 after a few days' illness, brought
 about by a paralytic stroke.

laide Rowland of this city, had been
 prominent in benevolent work and
 church activities for many years, and
 her place in the hearts of the citizens
 at large will be hard to fill. She
 was a member of Knox Presbyterian

TAX ON PULPWOOD
TO U. S. FAVORED

Hon. James Lyon Speaks At
 Rotary Luncheon in
 Fort William.

TO SAVE FORESTS

Minister of Lands and Forests
 Speaks To Rotary
 Club.

 Fort William, May 30.—Speaking at
 a luncheon of the Rotary Club here
 today, Hon. James Lyon, minister of
 lands and forests, outlined four main
 points of policy which he forecast
 would be followed by the Ontario
 government.

In regard to the export of pulp-
 wood, he said that he favored placing
 an export tax on pulpwood that is
 now being shipped from Ontario to
 the United States at least \$1 a
 cord, and this he would advocate in-
 creasing up to a point where it would
 conserve all the Ontario pulpwood
 for Canadian mills.

On the Fort William to Winnipeg
 highway, Mr. Lyon said that he was
 in favor of constructing within three
 years, of a motor highway, from Fort
 William to the Manitoba boundary,
 following the northern route, going
 to the north of the Lake of the
 Woods, to connect at the Manitoba
 boundary with the road projected by
 Manitoba at a point near Falcon
 Lake.

Touching on the aid to iron ore
 development, he said that he would
 favor the province assuming the
 whole of the bounty proposed of one
 cent a unit in the event of the De-
 ministery declining to assume one-half
 of the proposed bounty.

The minister also spoke of the
 policy of the government in coping
 with forest fires, and stated that this
 would be more aggressive, and that
 aeroplanes would be made use of ex-
 tensively for the purpose of control-
 ling and detecting fires.

ITALIAN CHAMBER
SCENE OF BATTLE

Socialists Take Offense At Be-

ing Called "That Gang"
 by Deputy.

Rome, May 30.—Reference by
 Signor Giunta, nationalist deputy, to
 the Socialists as "that gang" in the
 chamber today caused a general ex-
 change of insults between mem-
 bers of the Right and Left.

Discussing the return of the old
 standing rule, Signor Giunta de-
 clared he felt himself representative
 of the old Fascism, in which capacity
 he wished to recall the impositions,
 insults and violence sustained from
 "that gang." He pointed toward the
 benches where the Socialists were
 followers of former Premier Nitti
 were sitting.

General Benvenuto, newly elected
 of the opposition, declared he was
 the center of the chamber, followed
 by Giovanni Amendola, Fascist. A
 general exchange of blows followed,
 during which the general fell to the
 floor and after which the sitting was
 suspended.

When the session was resumed,
 President of the Chamber, Signor
 Depretis, deplored the incident and
