

## CHURCHES OBSERVE WHITE GIFT SUNDAY

Askin Street and Centennial Methodist Sunday School Make Offering.

Yesterday was "White Gift" Sunday at Askin Street and at Centennial Methodist Churches.

## BUS BADLY CRUSHED IN STREET CAR SMASH

A southbound Normal street car and a South London bus going in the same direction figured in a spectacular crash on Richmond street about 8 o'clock this morning.

The car driven by Motorman A. Osborne and in charge of Conductor L. Parker, struck the rear of the bus driven by H. J. Southam of 14 Rathmine street, and forced it against a heavy truck. The truck was almost completely wrecked.

Practically the entire right side of the bus was torn out and the windows smashed to fragments. Luckily there were no passengers in the bus at the time.

The driver of the bus escaped uninjured. It is not known yet whether Mr. Southam will take action against the Street Railway Company.

## SCORES WEST ATTITUDE TOWARDS EAST NATIONS

## Says Too Much Importance Attached to the Weather as Source of Colds

Dr. W. S. Downham, London's medical officer of health, is the authority for the assurance that people attach too much importance to the fallacy that the weather is always responsible for an epidemic of colds.

This is not necessarily the case, he explains. From the official remarks it can be added that colds more than often travel "in batches," as it were. One person is afflicted with the ailment and may pass it on to any number of persons encountered during the day. When they recover they may be missed for months or years.

While the weather is not responsible for such a number of cases as is popularly supposed, Dr. Downham explains, of course, that there is a greater possibility naturally for a cold epidemic during the real winter weather, as the human power of resistance (the mucous membrane, to be precise) is at a minimum.

It is quite possible, however, for a lucky person to go from month to month, through all changes of weather, and escape an attack, with just the ordinary precautions.

## Says Cocaine Served in Sugar Bowls at Wild Party Held by Movie Actors

Special to The Advertiser. Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 18.—How cocaine was served in sugar bowls at wild parties of movie actors, was described today by Evelyn Nesbit, former member of the Hollywood film colony.

"I was a 'dope' once, but I fought my way back and cured myself," declared Miss Nesbit, sending a word of hope to Walter Reid, celebrated screen star, who, according to his wife, is fighting a desperate battle against the drug habit.

Miss Nesbit, a year ago haggard and worn with her struggle to break the grip of narcotics on her system, has greatly improved in spirit and appearance since she won her fight. Only a few months ago she attempted suicide by taking an overdose of drugs when her uptown tea room in New York failed. Today, brisk, alert, she is the

manager of one of the most prosperous cabarets on Atlantic City's famous board walk.

"Oh, but it was a long, mean fight against 'the stuff,' as they called it," said Miss Nesbit.

"I began taking the stuff at Hollywood. There were dope agents at the time, and they were going to take orders. At one party the cocaine was put in a sugar bowl. Every few minutes somebody would say 'Pass the sugar.' It was a big job. At that time I wasn't taking it, but some time later a Follies girl gave me some for a toothache, and then the habit got the grip. Every cent I had went for dope. I put myself under a doctor's care to break away. He cut down the doses every day.

"It was a heart-breaking fight. The doctor told me it was all over. I was cured. Since then I haven't touched it."

## J. M. SPEERS HEADS INTERNATIONAL "Y"

New York Man Elected Chairman of Committee, Uniting Two Countries.

The election, just announced from New York, of James M. Speers, president of James McCutcheon & Co., linen merchants of that city, to the chairmanship of the Y. M. C. A., is of special interest to members and friends of the local association, because that committee is the general agent of all the 2,000 associations in North America.

The committee is composed of approximately 300 business and professional men of the United States and Canada, who with their employed staffs direct the service abroad, and certain features of the home work of the American and Canadian associations. Through it these associations carry on work in Europe, Russia, Siberia, Asia, the Near East, Africa and Latin America.

Mr. Speers succeeds Alfred E. Marling, former president of the New York State Chamber of Commerce, who had served as chairman since 1910.

Mr. Marling continues as a member of the committee, with which he has been actively associated for 30 years.

Mr. Marling was born in Canada—the son of a former pastor of Bond Street Church, Toronto. He has been a member of the Y. M. C. A. virtually all his life, having joined the famous Twenty-third street branch in New York City, the first Y. M. C. A. in the metropolis, when a boy.

During his chairmanship of the International committee, the extension of American Association service to foreign countries has had its largest growth. It was also during this period that the American Y. M. C. A. entered upon its service in Europe for soldiers and sailors, prisoners of war, and refugees. Mr. Marling was a member of the executive committee of the National War Council.

Mr. Speers was born in County Antrim, Ireland, coming to the United States in 1880. In the same year he entered the employ of the famous linen house of which, in 1912, he became president. He is officially connected with numerous secular and religious organizations and enterprises, among them the United States Life Insurance Company, of which he is a director. He was chairman of the Laymen's Missionary Movement. He is a member of the Union League Club of New York City. His home is in Montclair, N. J.

Officers elected to serve with Mr. Speers follows: 1st vice-chairman for home work, Cleveland E. Dodge, New York City; 2nd vice-chairman for home work, Roger H. Williams, New York City; 1st vice-chairman for foreign work, William D. Murray, Plainfield, N. J.; 2nd vice-chairman for foreign work, Gerald W. Birks, Montreal.

Three Denver Bandits Take Advantage of Transfer From Mint to Bank.

Denver, Colorado, Dec. 18.—Three bandits today shot and probably fatally wounded Charles Linton, a federal reserve bank guard, and escaped with about \$200,000 in currency of \$5 denomination, which was being loaded onto a federal reserve truck in front of the Denver mint. The funds were being transferred from the mint to the local federal reserve bank.

The robbers seized the gold, and sprang into a large automobile. As their car sped away, armed government guards inside the mint building fired from the windows of the mint at the robbers.

The entire Denver police force quickly was called into action in an effort to apprehend the robbers. The robbery occurred at 10:40 o'clock, a few minutes after the government employees had begun to load the gold onto the federal reserve truck.

While loading was in progress, an automobile drew up in front of the mint building. Three masked robbers sprang from it. Before the government employees knew what had happened, the bandits opened fire from high-powered rifles. The government employees returned the fire, but the robbers acted quickly, sprang to the motor truck, grabbed the bags of gold and escaped. While the robbery was going on, according to witnesses, a second automobile, armed with shot guns and rifles, stood twenty feet from the bank car, apparently ready to give aid should the bandits need assistance.

Sheriffs in near-by counties were quickly notified by the police in an effort to apprehend the robbers. At 11:30 a.m. R. J. Grant, director of the mint, announced officially that the bandits escaped with the entire consignment of \$200,000 for the Denver Federal Reserve Bank.

## BELIEVE HUGHES HAS MET DEFEAT

Australian Labor Party Is Leading With 40 Seats, While Government Is Second With 23.

Melbourne, Dec. 18.—(C. P. Cable, via Reuters.)—Although Premier W. M. Hughes expresses the opinion today that the Nationalists will still be the strongest party as a result of yesterday's general elections, present figures indicate the defeat of his government. It is impossible to forecast the result, owing to the incompleteness of the count and the effect of the withdrawal of preferences.

The Labor party at present is leading with 44 seats, while the Nationalist or government party has 23, the Country party six, and Liberals and Independents 3.

Complete returns, however, will probably render necessary a cutting down of the totals.

Minister of Customs Walter Massey Greene and Assistant Minister Lamont are being strongly pressed in their market, therefore, a return to the result is very uncertain.

Hon. Alexander Poynton, postmaster-general, will likely be defeated. In 1917 Premier Hughes was in power at the head of a United Labor party, which, however, failed on a referendum. Mr. Hughes formed a coalition government known as the United Labor party, made up of the Labor party and section of the Labor party which favored conscription. The coalition government, however, failed to maintain itself in power until the recent dissolution. Success of the Labor party in the present election, therefore, would mean a return to the status of 1917, but with Premier Hughes eliminated as its leader. He has held office continuously for eight years. In the event of a victory, bringing the full strength of Australia to bear in the war.

## REPORTS INCREASE IN FAMILY BUDGET

Cost of Living Takes Slight Jump in Month—Decreases During Year.

Ottawa, Dec. 18.—The average weekly family budget throughout Canada during November was slightly higher than in October, due to seasonal increase in farm products.

The budget was decidedly lower than in November, 1921, however.

The average weekly family budget of 29 staple foods in sixty cities was \$10.23 for November, as compared with \$10.23 for October; \$11.03 for November, 1921; \$16.82 for June, 1920 (the highest point reached), and \$7.78 for November, 1914.

The increase of six cents for the month was due to a substantial increase in eggs, with slight increases in milk, butter, cheese, sugar, which increases, however, were counteracted to some extent by slight decreases in meats, bread, flour, rolled oats, beans, evaporated apples, and potatoes.

Coal and wood averaged slightly lower.

Rent was also down slightly in the average.

The weekly budget, including fuel and rent, as well as foods, averaged \$20.38 for November, as compared with \$20.86 for October; \$21.60 for November, 1921; \$26.92 for July, 1920 (the highest point reached), and \$14.36 for November, 1914.

Montreal, Dec. 18.—Judgment has been rendered by Mr. Justice Beland at Montreal, dismissing with costs, a \$10,000 action for slander against Professor H. Walter of McGill University.

In dismissing the action, Mr. Justice Beland reviewed the whole case and the controversy between the two professors which led to criminal proceedings, Professor Morin being arrested and held in the court of king's bench in Montreal on a charge of having attempted to poison his colleague by throwing pills given into the latter's well at Elgin Road, Que. Professor Morin was acquitted.

## LONDON CHURCHES HOLD PRAYER WEEK

Ministers Arrange Christmas Week Services For All Congregations Combined.

Arrangements for a special Christmas week of prayer in all the Protestant churches of the city, with a mass meeting at some central church were made at the meeting of the Ministerial Alliance in the Y. M. C. A. this morning.

All the clergy were asked to press home upon their people the need of attending the services and making of them a source of inspiration for the coming year, and final arrangements for the central meeting were left to the executive committee.

Rev. Prof. Anderson was the speaker of the morning, dealing with the subject, "The Incarnation," of the Doctrine of the Incarnation.

## NAVIGATION CLOSES ON LAKE SUPERIOR

Only Three U. S. Grain Vessels Taking Last Cargoes to Ports.

Fort William, Dec. 18.—With the clearing of the only two steamers for which orders to load have been placed, the season of navigation closed here. Severe weather, following the storm of Monday last, hindered loading of last fifteen steamers, considerably, tugs being almost unable to keep the heavy ice broken sufficiently to allow of movement between elevators.

A large fleet cleared on the 12th before the insurance term expired, and they met with similar difficulties at the Soo. Unless the vessels loaded since then are able to get through the Soo without much delay some may have to winter at nearer ports than they are at present destined to.

As a result of the phenomenal volume of grain shipments since the middle of November, some 160 vessels will winter at Georgian Bay and lower lake ports with storage cargoes in addition to the cargoes which are for immediate unloading. Over forty of these will be in Canadian ports, some 75 or so at Buffalo, and 40 more at United States ports, if all reach the ports to which they are destined.

The cargoes in round numbers comprise 36,000,000 bushels of wheat, 3,340,000 bushels of oats, 1,644,000 bushels of barley, 178,700 bushels of flaxseed, and 1,996,000 bushels of rye. No further advantage has been taken of the temporary suspension of loading laws; vessels loaded last week, so only three U. S. vessels have taken last cargoes to Canadian ports. Six vessels will winter here, with grain for winter use.

The effects of the severe weather are seen in the movement of grain from farmers' hands to terminal elevators. Not until December 1st did the daily marketings by farmers at country points fall below a million bushels. So far it is reported over \$45,000,000 worth of grain has been approximately one-half of that amount, or about equal to the average daily deliveries for the first three months of the present crop year.

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## JAPANESE RELINQUISH AUSTRALIAN PROPERTY

Premier Hughes Brings Suit for Libel Against Newspaper as Result.

Sydney, Australia, Dec. 16.—It appears that land which certain newspapers recently stated Japanese had purchased along the New South Wales coast, was bought by a Japanese merchant as a speculation. He has since disposed of most of his holdings.

A sequel to the announcement is a suit begun by Premier W. M. Hughes against a newspaper for damages for alleged libel. The charge of libel is due to insinuations made by the newspaper in question that the Japanese had subscribed towards Premier Hughes' memorial fund.

## SURVIVORS BATTLE WAY TO SHELTER

Seven Out of 36 Who Were Aboard Wrecked Tug Reach Sault Ste. Marie.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Dec. 17.—Twenty-seven persons are missing and are believed to have been drowned or died from exposure following the disaster which overtook the tug Reliance when it struck off the rocks at Lizard Island four days ago.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Dec. 18.—Seven of the thirty-six persons, crew and passengers, known to have been aboard the Spanish River Paper Company's tug Reliance when she struck the rocks off North Lizard Island, 100 miles west of Sault Ste. Marie, last Wednesday morning, reached here last evening on the Algoma Central train from Frater, and two more, Jack Harten, the cook, and his wife, are at a camp not far from Frater. Mrs. Harten is quite ill as a result of the exposure.

The fate of the others is not known, but it is thought probable that they reached shelter either on the island or the mainland, though no word has been received from them. It is also thought possible that some are still on the boat, which is a staunch craft. The seven who have reached shore are: Ernest Thessalon, a wheelman; John Cudotte, Garden River, passenger; Fred Gardner, Cananque, passenger; Eugene Longpre, St. Jerome, passenger; Ernest Struck, Thessalon, passenger.

Curried off at the time of the running on the rocks there was a bad snowstorm, which cleared up ten minutes after they struck. One of the three lifeboats was immediately lowered, and Currie was put in charge, but the survivors are not clear as to whether another boat was let down or not. They thought they saw one, but just then the waves and a recurrence of the snow cut off their vision.

They attempted to reach Jackson's Cove, but were forced to land on a land not far from the mouth of Sand River. At three that afternoon they caught their last sight of the tug, which was then still afloat, though listed to the port side.

After a 16-mile tramp over hills hundreds of feet high and crossing several streams, one of which they waded in water up to their waists, and spending two nights in the open, they reached Boisjane's camp, Mrs. Harten, after a game struggle, had given out when only a short distance from the camp, but help was sent back from there to aid her.

Hours Without Food.

The members of the party were 36 hours without food, but with the exception of Mrs. Harten appear to be little the worse for their journey, though some suffered severe frost-bites.

The tug Gray, which has been trying to reach Lizard Island since Thursday, made another attempt to leave Boisjane's Bay this morning, but was forced back by a storm. She is being reinforced by the icebreaker Favorite and the tugboat, which left the Soo shortly after noon today.
