ACQUIRES BIG TIMBER LIMITS

Dalhousie Lumber Co. Buys 100 Square Miles in Quebec Will Erect a Large Plant.

The Dalhousie Lumber Co., Ltd., which now, possesses extensive timber limits in Restigouche county, with headquarters at Dalhousie, N. B., last week closed a deal by which it takes over 100 square miles of well wooded limits located on the York River, Gaspé county (P. Q.).

The purchase was made from the Gaspé Trading Company and sixty miles of these valuable limits are in fee simple. The new owners will proceed at once to enlarge the plant, which will consist of shingle mill, long lumber and pulp mill.

The estimated value of the property after the proposed improvements are made will be about \$350,000. The operations at Gaspé will be under the management of the head office of the Dalhousie Lumber Company at Dalhousie, with A. H. Hilliard, formerly from St. John, as manager.

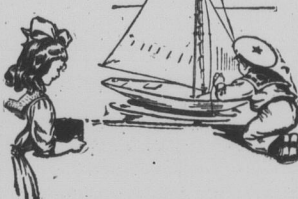

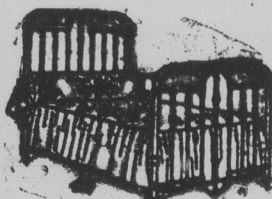

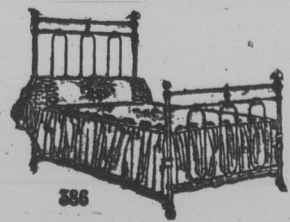
