THE MOUNTAIN AND THE MOUSE.

Some few months ago, when our waterworks gave out, and when we had to fall back on the primitive system of delivering water from houses to houses by the fall it spontaneously occurred to many citizens that there were several screws loose in Toronto's civic government. Bankers complied official figures show that our debt was greater than any other city on the continent. Honest citizens protested that the civic machine was, or had been, in the hands of corrupt politicians and jobbers. The papers were filled with letters from prominent citizens bewailing the unenviable position in which the city found itself. It really seemed as if the ratapatties of Toronto were determined to do something to lift themselves out of the mire. Public meetings were held to devise a new constitution for the city. A special committee of the City Council was formed to wrestle with the matter, and they did wrestle with it to the best of their ability. The Ratapatties' Association and other public bodies discussed the pros and cons of Civic Reform. Civic Reform, in short, was the hot question we have had in Toronto during the present year, the war scare alone excepted.

The whole city was in labor over the thing. The pains came on in time. The city went to bed in great distress. And what was the outcome?

Civic Reform has experienced a regeneration. We have to put up with a humbug.

Bob Fleming is as genuine an all-around humbug as is going. He is now endeavoring to humbug the people into providing him with a situation at a big salary.

Bob Fleming is out of a job. He can't get the Assessment Commission. He isn't out for a banker. There is no money nowadays in the temperance business.

Bob Fleming, the only thing that approaches that high and honorable office in the capacity of an incident seeking employment. This is the outcome of the movement for Civic Reform.

If the citizens were to commit the blunder of electing Bob Fleming, they would be represented by a man who is insincere. He poses as a temperance man at one minute and the next he is confidentially unboasting himself to hotel-keepers and publicans. His insincerity in this connection and in other matters is so well-known to those who have an insight into the true character of Bob Fleming that we need not dwell at greater length upon this characteristic of his make-up.

Bob Fleming is not only a humbug himself but he is surrounded by humbugs. The News and the aqueductors support him. The former, as everyone knows, is the proponent of the Toronto press. Two years ago The News repudiated Fleming as vigorously as it was able. It charged him with connivance with the Street Railway Co. to alter the franchise agreement in such a way as would have caused the city to lose several hundred thousand dollars. It specified his many shortcomings and disgraced if it had anything further to do with Bob Fleming. The News is now advocating the cause of the Consumer's Gas Company as against the rights of the citizens. The News is trying to betray the citizens into letting the pack of hungry aqueductors into the city treasury. What we want in Toronto to-day is a man of character, a man of sincerity and courage, who will take who and scourge them these pests. We want a man who will send them about his business and force them to earn an honest living. We don't want them to make light of us. We don't want them to supply us with water. The aqueductors and Bob Fleming are both after the same game: They want to make a living. If not a fortune, by collecting tribute from the ratepayers.

Our advice is to send all these people adrift. Make them produce something. Make them earn an honest livelihood. If they can't make a living in Toronto in the same way as respectable citizens do, let them go to the Northwest and grow wheat and herd cattle. That's exactly where the whole game should be. The way get cheap light is not to let a new parasite in upon us, but to regulate, and, if necessary, destroy the parasites that already feed upon us. The way to improve our present system and not to further add to the expense by bringing into existence other company whose shareholders and directors will be just as useful to the community as drones are in the hive.

Bob Fleming believes in the aqueductors. Although the aqueductors have been told half a dozen times by the people and the council that they are a nuisance, yet Bob Fleming is clinging to his coat tails. If Fleming should be elected, the aqueductors will have another innings and for another whole year the city will be subjected to an intolerable nuisance.

Fellow-citizens, spare the city from the onslaughts of this pack of ravenous wolves. They have no conscience. They are insincere. Their only object is to squeeze the city as one would a lemon.
