Persons who have not tasted strong drink for years, and others. who never drank or never intended to moderate drinkers and hard drinkers are receiving through the mail pam phlets and price lists from lique dealers in Montreal who intrude their obnoxious propaganda into the quiet sober homes of temperate com munities in an endeavor to bring their barrooms under our very noses, and to flood the country with strong drink. Under the present law the post office people are obliged to handle this matter. There is not a newspaper in Nova Scotia that will carry one of these advertisements for any money. Yet the mails carr, them into every part of the country, with the result that thousands of dollars daily are sent to Montreal from this province alone for intoxicating liquor "for personal and family use." So we have the unreasonable conditions that while no person in this province


