It is quite safe to say that the results of the Provincial Elections of last week were a complete surprise to electors in general. Previous to voting each side prophesied a victory for itself, but that is a common prediction. As to the cause of results we will give only two cogent reasons. The Conservative candidates got the most votes; the people wanted a change and have gotten it. A whole lot more might be said but let it go at that. Below are given results in detail of Annapolis County and figure totals as we have received them for the other counties. Election night here was very disagreeable but large numbers of voters viewed with interest the results as bulletined from the Monitor office. When results became certain for the county supporters of Mr. Harry McKenzie, the successful and popular Bridgetown boy who was elected, carried him on their shoulders to the Court House preceded by the Bridgetown Band. Here Mr. McKenzie thanked his supporters cordially and speeches were also made by Mr. A. B. McKenzie and Col. C. E. Bent. Shortly afterwards the time honored bonfire was alight at the head of Queen Street. Mr. McKenzie was summoned down to Annapolis and there addressed his friends in words of appreciation.
