APPO KRISPS THE COMING FOOD

Well Attended Meeting in the Court House Hears Splendid Address From Col. Innes—New Food Receives High Praise.

On Friday evening a very well attended meeting was held in the Court House, called by the Board of Trade and addressed by Col. Innes, Secretary-Treasurer of Appo Krisps.

Mr. M. C. Foster, President of the Bridgetown Board of Trade presided. Mr. Gladstone Parker was appointed Secretary pro tem.

Col. Innes gave an excellent address referring first in a general way to the benefits of further industries to the Annapolis Valley with a new complimentary references to Nova Scotia plants including Moirs and Stanfields and others which did business from coast to coast, and led up to the inception of the idea of utilizing apples in the Valley through the manufacture of Appo Krisps.

He paid a suitable tribute to Mr. G. P. Humphreys, who originated the idea and returned to his work during war time when in England he supervised the operations of thirty-three dehydrating plants. He had come to this country at the instance of the C. P. R. to look into the possibilities of developing industries in the Annapolis Valley and a result was the development of the idea of manufacturing Appo Krisps, the first time in history that a combination of fruit and grain had been used in the manufacture of a breakfast food. Patents had been taken out in Canada and the United States and were being taken out in other countries and the manufacture on an extensive scale as contemplated would furnish to orchardists a ready market for No. 3's and Domestic.

Col. Innes described briefly the main features of manufacture, the component product which is composed of 30% apples and 70% wheat, and expressed pleasure at the interest created through the Valley in the new product and the support which was being accorded by the investing public. The plant would employ about fifty hands at its first inception and there would of course be provision made as the business developed and markets were widened.

Short speeches were made by Mr. O. W. Graves, Stipendiary P. R. Pay, Mayor Hicks and Mr. F. M. Ruggles. All spoke definitely and to the point. Mayor Hicks felt sure that the new company had the support of Town Council, Board of Trade and the entire community.

Mr. F. M. Ruggles believed that Appo Krisps was the best investment which he had ever had anything to do with. It was a splendid product and had no competitor and that the conception and manufacture were unique. At the close of the meeting Col. Innes was warmly thanked for his excellent address.

During the evening cartons of Appo Krisps were distributed and most favorably commented upon. Many citizens had no hesitation in proclaiming the product more to their tastes than any breakfast food which they had thus far tasted. The new food has beyond question the highest nutritive and digestive qualities and it flavor is splendid. There seems no reason at all to doubt that once manufacturing is commenced the new product will gain instant favor with thousands of consumers and once tasted always desired and appreciated as a most palatable breakfast food with the highest nutritive properties.
