The Liberal success in the general elections, held yesterday, was the occasion for great rejoicing in the ranks of the winning party all over Canada.

There were a great many surprises incasioned by the results in the various provinces. Quebec went strongly against Government, while Ontario, where regular revolution was predicted, stood by Sir Charles Tupper better than any other section of the country. British Col-umbia.North-West Territories. Manitoba, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick each gave a stronger Liberal representation than in the last House, while Prince Edward Hand increased the Conserva-tive contingent from that province. Some of the notable defeats are the following: Hon. David Mills in Bothwell, William Paterson in South Brant, A. McNeill in North Brues, the two Conservative can-didates in Hamilton, and both Conser-vative candidates in Ottawa City. In Queboc, Messrs. Taillon (Postmaster-Gen-eral). Angers (President of the Coun-eral) and Desjurdins (Public Works), all met their Waterloo. But three Con-eratives were elected out of the eight geats on the Island of Montreal. In New Brunswick the old and esteemed Liberal veteran, A. H. Gillmor, was defeated in Charloite; while Col. Donville, Liberal, captured Hou. George E. Foster's old gefeated in Annapolis, and Joseph Mar-tin in Winnipeg. The Premier was elect-ed in Cope Breton, Mr. Laurier in Que-bec East and in Saskatchewan; Dalton McCarthy in Brandon and in North Sim-Soc.


