The Liberal success in the general elections, held yesterday, was the occasion for great rejoicing in the ranks of the winning party all over Canada.

Some of the notable defeats are the following: Hon. David Mills in Bothwell, William Paterson in South Brant, A. McNeill in North Brant, the two Conservative candidates in Hamilton, and both Conservative candidates in Ottawa City.

A special feature of the fight in Nova Scotia was the capture of Cumberland by the Liberals, against the defeat of Hon. A. R. Dickey, the Minister of Justice, by a small majority, at latest advice.

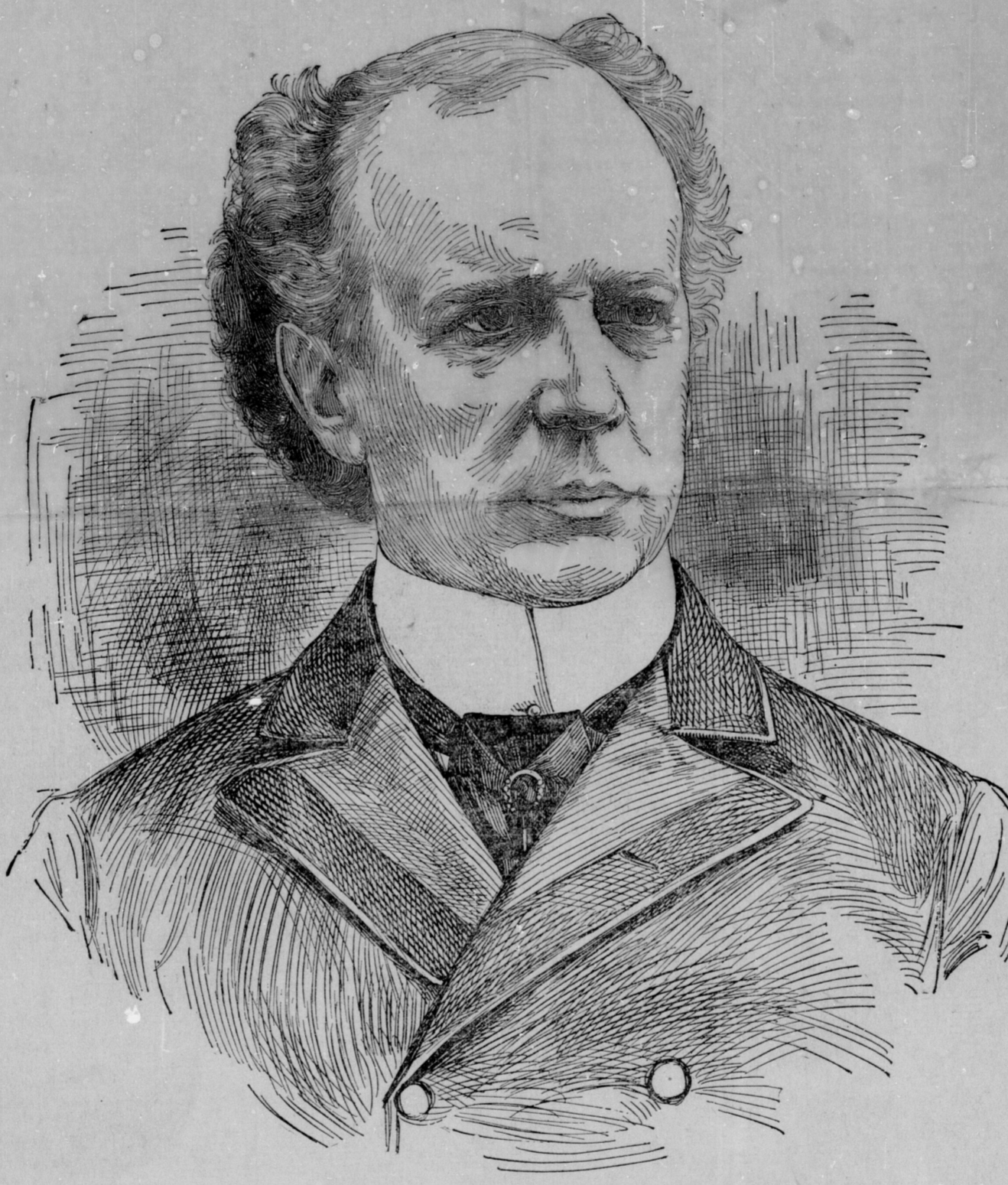
