CHALK OUTLINE PAINT.—Take two parts (in bulk) of water lime ground fine, one part (in bulk) of white lead ground in oil. Mix them thoroughly by adding ~~one~~ boiled linseed oil, enough to prepare it to pass through a paint mill, after which temper with oil till it can be applied with a common paint brush. Make any color to suit. It will last ~~longer~~ times as long as lead paint, and cost not one-tenth as much. It is superior.

BARKETT'S CERTAIN PREVENTIVE OF THE POTATO ROT.—Sow unleached ashes over the field once a week for six weeks, soon after the second hoeing. Apply two or three bushels to the acre, using care to dust the tops well. It has never been known to fail, where faithfully tested.

CERTAIN CURE FOR CORNS.—One teaspoonful of tar, one of coarse brown sugar, and one of saltpetre. The whole to be warmed together and spread it on kid leather the size of the corns, and in two days they will be dried out.
