BULLS SWEEP EVERYTHING BE-FORE THEM - WALL STREET BOOM TAKES HOLD OF THE CHICAGO PIT-CONTINENTAL SHORTS FORCED TO COVER.

Chicago Jan. 26,

Wheat opened this morning with a veritable boom, being well in advance of last night's close. Cables were stronger than they have been for many a day, quotations being one point and a quarter in advance of yesterday's. Everything was in favor of the Bulls at the opening; reports were in circulation that the open weather throughout the wheat belt was liable to injure the uncovered wheat, that the Argentine crop belt was liable to injure the uncovered wheat, that the Argentine crop was very slow in moving, and that the policy of hand-to-mouth, which the continental powers have been pursuing, caused a good cash demand. On this bulge there were many prepared to take profits, those who had bought during last week considering that six points of an advance was sufficient for the present, consequently prices sagged off a little temporarilly. They soon recover, however, and close with a rush, wheat selling at 79½ for May, on shorts being forced to cover.

Traders, however, believe in a further advance, on the expectation of an accumulating Bullish sentiment, if the market holds the present level of prices, and there is some evidences of a converted effort to bring about a Bull market by strong people in the East and West.
