EDITORIAL NOTES.

There is no more genial gentleman affoat than the French Commodoreon this station. During a visit last year of several English officers to the vessel which carries his broad pendant some good-natured discussion took place about the lobster. "The people of Newfoundland" said the Commodore, who speaks English very fluently, "say the lobstare is not a fish; the French say he is a fish." Whether or no, the "lobstare" is likely to make a very pretty kattle of fish between France and Eugland.

Almost every Canadian newspaper, the well-informed Montreal Gasette included, in which we have seen noted the death of the Marquis of Normanby, writes it "Normandy," The matter is a trifle, but it reminds us of a discussion we remember to have seen recorded somewhere in which an American browbeat an Englishman on this very point. "Every one," said the American, "knows there is a Normandy, but who ever heard of Normanby?". Nevertheless the confident American was all wrong.
