

work under existing conditions is absolutely inhuman. How those girls can stand it, I don't know. Telephones are ringing and the girls are running around. The more confusion that exists, the fewer passports issued. No relief is in sight as far as I can see.

The idea of regional offices, whatever their merit may be, does not offer any solution; I wonder whether it could be a solution anyway. In regard to unemployment insurance the government asked the public to use the mails. It is now talking of reversing the process.

I do not think that the government does have a policy or has one clue about what to do in this situation. The minister talks of refunding the money paid for passports. Is he also going to refund the money people lose because they could not make a charter flight? There are more significant expenditures involved than just the passport fee.

The passport office was designed to operate at a nice, leisurely pace. That leisurely pace has now disappeared. I hope the minister will reply to the suggestion that an emergency does exist, and that he appoint an emergency controller for the passport office immediately to investigate what the problem in the office is, and get the situation cleared up. The minister's statement today is not one designed to instil any confidence for the future.

**Mr. Gilbert Rondeau (Shefford):** Mr. Speaker, if we were not aware of the facts in respect of the passport problem, we could believe that the opinions expressed by the hon. member who has just resumed his seat are exaggerated. But, it happens that we have had to help several persons to obtain their passports. We, of the Ralliement Cr ditiste, are experiencing the same difficulties and we must address the same criticisms to the minister because he has not taken in time the necessary steps to prevent such occurrences.

On the other hand, we are not blaming the officials of the passport office who, up to now, have fully co-operated with us.

However, since there has been in the last few months such an increase in the number of applications for passports, the minister's statement was, I think, too long in coming. We also believe that he did not resort to the proper means to alleviate the situation, because the problem is growing worse every month.
