CANADOME PROGRAM

Question No. 1,904-Mr. MacDonald (Egmont):

What is being done with the Canadome program during the winter, and are there any plans to make these facilities available for primary and secondary schools during the school year?

Hon. Martin P. O'Connell (Minister of State): The three Canadome displays will be held in storage during the winter months, but material printed for distribution in the Canadomes will continue to be distributed. Plans for the utilization of the Canadomes next year have not yet been finalized.

BANKRUPTCIES

Mr. J. A. From January 1, 1969 to September 30, 1971, 2287 corporate bankruptcies were declared. No distinction is made between limited and incorporated companies in the records of the Bankruptcy Branch.
