Inquiries of the Ministry

can direct it to his parliamentary secretary. It relates to a question asked about two weeks ago in the House by my hon. friend from Wellington. It had to do with the interest rates charged by the Industrial Development Bank. Will the government take steps to ensure that interest rates charged by the Industrial Development Bank are at least brought into line with those charged on comparable loans by commercial banks so that the IDB can carry out the duties it was intended to carry out?

Mr. P. M. Mahoney (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Finance): I will be glad to look into the matter and report to the hon. member later.

MEETING OF PRIME MINISTER AND PRESIDENT NIXON— DISCUSSION OF PAVING OF ALASKA HIGHWAY

It has to do with the paving of the Alaska highway. REPRESENTATIONS TO CANADA DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION TO PREVENT SALE OF LA PRÉVOYANCE TO UNITED STATES INTERESTS

Mr. Georges Valade (Sainte-Marie): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the right hon. Prime Minister. I consider it to be urgent and important in view of the increasing rumours about a sale of La Prévoyance insurance company to American interests. Since the Canadian Development Corporation now has a Board of Directors, does the Prime Minister intend to call on that government agency to prevent the sale of that Quebec insurance company to a foreign concern?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I have had an opportunity of discussing the matter with the Minister of Finance. He has explained that as the company involved is incorporated under provincial legislation the federal government itself cannot intervene as it does in the case of insurance companies incorporated

under federal legislation. In this case, then, it would rather be the responsibility of provincial authorities.

As to the second part of the question, concerning the Canada Development Corporation, I must say I am rather surprised that the hon. member would already want the government to interfere and tell this Corporation how to operate. This was not our purpose in establishing the Canada Development Corporation. However, I will consider the hon. member's suggestion.

Mr. Valade: Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary.

I would like to ask the Prime Minister whether this new government agency has a duty to try and invest in Canadian companies in order to prevent their falling into foreign hands. If this is the case, can the agency prevent this sale, and can they themselves see to the interests or to the purchase of La Prévoyance?

Mr. Trudeau: Mr. Speaker, this is one of the objectives of the Canada Development Corporation, and just in case they might not be aware of the possibility suggested by the hon. member, maybe the government could bring this matter to their attention.
