Mr. Riis: You're afraid of the people, Jim. Admit it.

Mr. Hawkes: That is the job of the committee. New Democratic Members want it to go visiting. It would be lovely for committee members to visit Victoria, it is beautiful in Victoria. Let's go to P.E.I. and eat lobster. Let's go to Newfoundland and take a tour on a boat.

We were sent here to do a job, not to fly around the country in airplanes spending taxpayers' dollars on fancy meals, but to sit here, eat our sandwiches at suppertime, and do the job. That is what we were sent here to do and this Party will make sure that we do it.

Mr. Riis: Fifty million dollars on Conservative propaganda on the trade deal.

Mr. Hawkes: You can't have a vacation 365 days a year travelling around the world. You have to settle down and do some work from time to time.

The Member for Winnipeg—Fort Garry (Mr. Axworthy) moved the motion that the committee travel on July 7, six days ago. Overwhelmingly the committee members said no.

Mr. Gauthier: Of course, they're all Tories. Tories don't move.

Mr. Hawkes: If I spend eight hours flying to Calgary and back I cannot hear witnesses, pay attention to the fine print, and make the decisions which have to be made. If I fly off to Newfoundland it will take another day or two. The NDP wants to stop the Government from implementing the will of the Canadian people.

Mr. Riis: You couldn't be further from the truth.

Mr. Hawkes: Canadians want jobs and better paying jobs.

Mr. Riis: Prime Minister Mulroney campaigned against the trade deal.

Mr. Hawkes: We were elected four years ago on a platform of jobs, jobs, jobs. One and a quarter million jobs later they are telling us that everything we do is wrong.

Mr. Riis: You can't trust the Tories.

Mr. Hawkes: They have been saying it ever since the first Budget.

Mr. Riis: You can't trust the Prime Minister.

Mr. Hawkes: The people in the gallery should know that when they say we are wrong it is the best evidence that we are right. Every time they say we are wrong more jobs are created in the Canadian economy and more people have money to spend to put better food on the table and obtain better accommodation, better transportation, and a chance to take a vacation.

Mr. Riis: You're a joke, Jim.

Mr. Riis: You're scared to go to the people now, Jim. Admit it.

Mr. Hawkes: Madam Speaker, when the Opposition looks at the world upside down it comes to the conclusion that we are scared.

Mr. Riis: If you stood upside down you'd look a lot better.

Mr. Hawkes: Their behaviour tells us that they are scared. Every moment of delay is because they are afraid of the voters' judgment.

Mr. Orlikow: Call the election tomorrow.

Mr. Hawkes: They are afraid by how satisfied Canadian people are with the work of the Government.

Mr. Riis: Have you not read a single poll in the last four years?

Mr. Hawkes: They know how much it has meant to the standard of living of Canadians. They would like to keep us here forever. They would like to filibuster forever.

Therefore, Madam Speaker, it gives to me great pleasure to tell this House in the clearest terms possible that it is time to get on with the business of the nation. I ask for the support of all Members of this House and their approval of the following motion:

That this House do now proceed to Orders of the Day.
