Dear Professor Whipple:-

Let me acknowledge receipt of
your letter of the 15th of February.

We shall expect you in Montreal on the
evening of Thursday, the 22nd. You will be met at the
station and escorted to the Windsor Hotel, where accom-
modation has been reserved for Mrs. Whipple and your-
self until Saturday night. Reservations of two lower
berths on the train leaving Montreal on Saturday, the
24th have been made.

We have changed the hour of the lecture
from five o'clock in the afternoon to 1. p.m. These
lectures are attended largely by business men and we
run them on something the same lines as practised by
Canadian Clubs, Rotary Clubs, etc. We assemble at the
Windsor Hotel at 1 o'clock, ^{for luncheon} which is over about 1.30,
then the lecturer makes his address and from 35 to 40
minutes is about the limit of time. This will leave
your afternoon entirely free. I think that Mr. E. W.
Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and
Chancellor of the University, will preside at the
luncheon at which you will make your address.
