

A crisp lettuce leaf with a hit of mayonnaise dressing goes well with brown bread. My favorite brown bread sandwiches are made as follows: Spread and cut brown bread (baked in one-half pound baking-powder tins) as for other sandwiches. Put between buttered layers one-half tablespoonful of finely chopped peanuts, seasoned with salt, paprika, one-half teaspoonful of powdered sugar; then moisten with three tablespoonfuls of sour heavy cream beaten until stiff.

fuice to give a pleasant additional flavor makes a good filling for a white or a brown bread sandwich; perhaps it is at its best, however, when spread between any thin unsweetened wafer

An odd sweet sandwich not made of bread at all is known as a Rochester Sandwich. They are particularly dainty for afternoon teas. Mash a cream cheese and season with salt and paprika. Spread on thin, crisp, round cheesels cookies and put termson and Grand March. 123 chocolate cookies and put together in pairs. Arrange, overlapping each other in circular fashion, on a plate covered with a dolly.

Honor Sandwiches: Cut white bread in slices and shape with a round cutter two and one-half inches in diameter. With a doughnut cutter of the same diameter cut circular pieces with the centres removed to fit pieces already centres removed to fit pieces with the cut. Spread circular pieces with pimento-butter, cover with the ringshaped pieces and garnish each with a slice of pimola. Arrange on a fancy plate covered with a doily. For the pimento butter work one-fourth of a cupful of butter until creamy, using a wooden speon, and add two canned pimentoes which have been pounded to a paste. Season with salt.
