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The Nursery

While we have been busy discussing the mental development of our babies, we have not, I hope, relaxed in any degree our vigilance regarding the physical welfare. Generally, by the time the child is 12 or 14 months old, one has become so used to the regular routine of care and feeding, that it almost looks after itself. And when you watch the little mind developing, and trace the cause and effect of every action, you become so intensely interested that if you are not careful you may overlook some physical necessity. For instance, the mother of the baby at our house wondered why the little man didn't sleep as well as formerly. He wakened every morning about 4 o'clock, and cried loud and long.

Then the aunt who loved the baby, and thru her great love remembered everything, declared that he was hungry.

And so it was. The babe was growing quickly and splendidly, and, in her brave attempts to follow the intricate mental growth, the little mother had completely overlooked the growth of the stomach.

Especially, she increased the quality and quantity of baby's supper and he slept as she knew he ought to, but had overlooked why he didn't.

While the mind has been developing the body should have kept pace with it. The weight has been increasing, and the body lengthening out. The arms and legs should grow in proportion to the trunk, and be well shaped. The head should be round and symmetrical. The bony opening in the top of the head should be entirely closed at 18 months or two years. The teeth should come easily and according to schedule time. The chest should be broad and well developed. The child should carry himself erect. Faulty positions while standing or sitting are habits that should be guarded against, constantly. The child should be fat, with the solid fat of firm muscles, and should eat and sleep well.

Meanwhile, the mental development goes forward rapidly. Every day the child learns something new, and every day the mother should direct the new knowledge along proper channels. He must think and act for himself as much as possible, with regard to discipline, and should be trained to entertain himself some hours of the day.

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
