

Mr. Coombs proceeded to show that the paying of the agreement would mean the handing over to the company of a perpetual franchise. At the end of 17 years, when the present franchise expires, the two tracks would be on exactly the same footing. In 1929 the company would have the right of renewing the franchise, and the city of North Toronto would be obliged to arbitrate on such details as fares, improved service and so forth.
