

TORONTO WELCOMES A HERO OF FRANCE

General Paul Pau Greeted by Mayor and City Council. NEVER BE FORGOTTEN

General Paul Pau, heading the French mission, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon at 4.15, and was officially welcomed by Sir William Hearst, premier; His Worship Mayor Church, Brig-Gen. Gunn, and the city council, who were in session.

General Pau was dressed in the sky blue uniform of the army, and upon his breast were the Legion of Honor and the Croix de Guerre medals.

Mayor Church, in his speech of welcome, dwelt upon the fact that to the end of time the soil of France would remain sacred to Canadians, as so many brave lads from this country had found there, an everlasting resting place.

Speedy Recovery. In conclusion, his worship asked to have conveyed to his beloved, revered, honored and immortal president, M. Clemenceau, "our deepest sympathy for him in his illness and our fond hope and best wishes for a speedy recovery, also our distinguished gratitude for all he has done for liberty and civilization."

She Kept Her Word. "The true greatness of France," stated General Pau, "was in 1914 when she kept her word to keep her existence. The Germans were astonished that the British and French should fight together. It was King Edward VII. who helped greatly to unite these two countries in friendship."

Gen. Paul Pau, the distinguished soldier now visiting Toronto, is on his way to start a drive around the city by the mayor, following which he will attend to the carrying of the Canadian and Empire Clubs at the King Edward Hotel.
