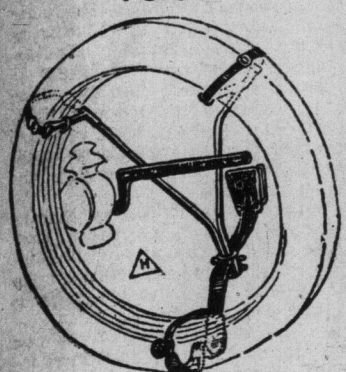

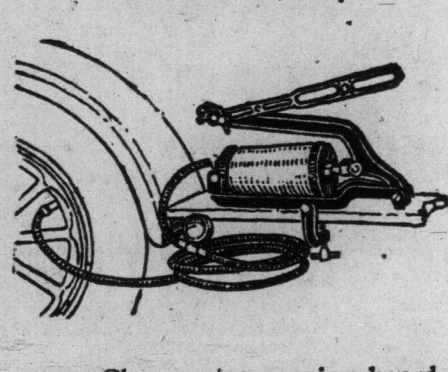

Rear Tire Holder for Fords



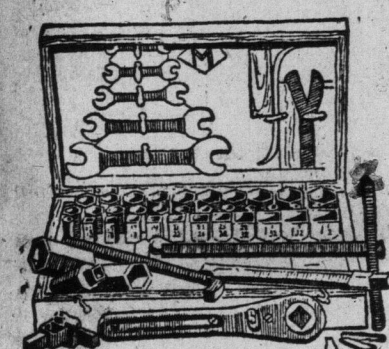

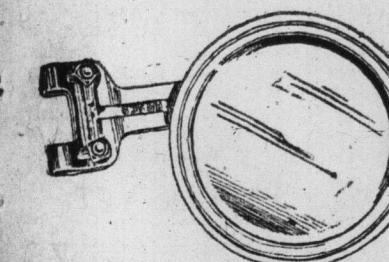

## DISEASE DECLINES THRUOUT PROVINCE

Decrease of 551 in Communicable Cases—Diphtheria Heads the List.

The health of the province, as indicated by the reports of the local boards of health of communicable diseases for the month of August, may be considered very satisfactory. The de-

crease in cases is 551. The most marked reductions are in typhoid fever, measles and whooping cough. The reports of medical officers of health of venereal diseases show a decrease of 123 cases. Last month there were thirty cases of smallpox as against 21 in 1918, and no deaths in either case. Diphtheria heads the list last month with 190 cases and 27 deaths, as compared with 164 and 11, respectively, in August, 1918. Next comes tuberculosis, with 176 cases and 109 deaths last month, against 206 and 116 last year. There were 120 cases and two deaths from scarlet fever, compared with 191, and one in August, 1918. There were eight cases of influenza last week and no deaths. No cases were reported in

August, 1918. Typhoid fever dropped from 240 cases and 27 deaths last year to 69 and 16, respectively, last week. Whooping cough fell from 246 cases and 12 deaths in August, 1918, to 112 and 14 last month. There were only 64 cases of measles last month, and no deaths, as against 247 cases and six deaths in August, 1918.

SPEND \$5,000,000 IN LOUISBERG. Sydney, N. S., Sept. 5.—Work on a \$5,000,000 drydock for Louisberg harbor will begin by the first of 1920, according to the statement made to the Canadian Press yesterday by J. W. Madden, one of the incorporators of the Louisberg Drydock and Shipbuilding Company.

## VETERANS HELP CITY ARCHITECT

Vocational Training Sends Student to Assist Mr. Pearce.

The city architect is to have a student—a returned soldier. The D.S.C.R. state that the vocational training class in architecture is overcrowded and have asked Mr. Pearce to give a

returned man six months' experience in his department, the government paying his salary in the usual way. The city architect has consented to take the student and he will report on Monday. It appears from a statement made by Mr. Pearce yesterday that his department needs restocking somewhat badly. He said that if it had not been for the returned men who were willing to come into his department and work whilst he was awaiting the board of control's approval of his recommendations his department would have been very much embarrassed. High Pay Elsewhere. "As stated some days ago," he said, "I have already lost 20 per cent. of my staff. Outside concerns have offered

them as high as 125 per cent. increase," explained Mr. Pearce, adding: "On Aug. 22 I sent a recommendation on to the board of control that one of my staff be appointed chief concrete inspector at a salary of \$1600 to fill the position left by Mr. Smith, who had resigned to accept another position. "Before the recommendation even went thru the man in question informed me that he could not accept the promotion, as the government had offered him a position of \$400 a year more and he intended to accept it." "How do you propose to meet the situation?" he was asked. "I am very hopeful of the men who have applied for the vacancies. Nearly all are university graduates, and all

of course, are men who have seen active service."
