

It must not be used by people who have any disease of the nervous system. In a word, it must not be used by anyone who would be unpleasantly affected, or who would be disturbed by hearty meal. Under any of thos very common conditions tobacco might be dangerous, and it is not necessary to say that, for many reasons of all

Judged therapeutically, tobacco has an incontestable action on the intestinal canal. Continues Dr. Nalpasse:
"Many people are forced to smoke at least one cigaret as an aperient be-fore the morning meal; as an aperient the most powerful diuretics are less effective than the after-dinner cigar. 
