Mr. Justice Rose yesterday heard the argument in the case of certain bondholders of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway against the Folger brothers, managers of the road. What the bondholders say is shortly this: That the Folgers in their individual capacity issued a writ for \$60,000 against the railway and then as managers of the road, employed another firm of solicitors to consent to judgment on behalf of the railway company; they also had a receiver appointed. Now the bondholders want to set aside the appointment of this receiver, and the judgment, which, they say, was obtained by collusion, and they ask for the appointment of a new receiver and manager to the road.

Friendly Societies' Legal Tangie.

The Manchester Unity, I.O.O.F., have brought suit to restrain the Canadian Order of Oddfellows and J. A. McMurtry, from using the words "Manchester Unity" in connection with their insurance business or otherwise.
