Soldiering in Ye Olden Times.

Mr. John Nunn, expresident of Her Majesty's Army and Navy Veterans, came ncross some interesting military documents a few days ago. They consist principally of commissariat orders, dated from Montreal, in various months of 1812. One of them states that His Excellency, the Commander of the Forces, had directed 300 gallons of rum to be forwarded immediately to West Canada, and that an additional quantity of 2000 gallons would also be forwarded for the use of the troops. It is evident that in those days the capteen question did not trouble the military authorities. Other letters refer to further supplies of rum, beef, flour and bread. Respecting the quality of the latter there was a complaint, which was officially investigated, that the bread had not been sufficiently baked.
