London, June 19.—In the House of Lords to-day, Foreign Minister Lansdowne announced that the British Minister to Servia had been instructed to withdraw from Belgrade for some time, on the arrival there of King Peter, and in the meanwhile to do nothing which could be construed as a recognition of the new government. Lord Lansdowne expressed indignation at the crimes at Belgrade, and said he thought it was not desirable that Sir George Bonham, the British Minister, should be in that city when the new regime was inaugurated. AGITATORS NOW WARNED.

Senate Committee Adopts Loughheed's Bill as Amended.

Ottawa, June 19.—The Banking and Commerce Committee of the Senate Committee received and adopted the report of the sub-committee to whom was referred Senator Loughheed's bill against labor agitators who seek to cause strikes. The bill now provides as follows:

"Whoever is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years' imprisonment who, not being a British subject, and being a resident in Canada, during one year next before the commission of the offence, does by any means, or by any act, or by any omission, induce any strike or lock-out, or the continuance of an strike or lock-out.

"This section shall not apply to any person who, being a duly accredited officer of any international organization, comes into Canada to bring about a settlement of any strike or lock-out.

"In any proceeding under this section the burden of proof as to nationality, domicile and residence shall rest upon the person accused."
