

BARTEL'S FIGHT

Brewer's Fortune Has Shrunk \$300,000.

Toronto, July 22.-Incensed at the sight of his father, the former Auburn, N. Y., brewer, tottering to meet apopleptic stroke, induced by excitement, Hermann Bartels, jun., states emphatically that he never will rest until someone has been brought to book in connection with this now celebrated case.

Hermann Bartels, jun., a determinedlocking Syracuse business-man, visited his father at the jail with Mr. Bartel's sister. They were shown into a side room where, after a time, Mr. Bartels, who was sent to jail for 90 days for escaping from custody, came in. The three stayed together only some fifteen minutes, and afterward Mr. Bartels, jun., returned to Syracuse, and his aunt went back to Auturn, N. Y.
