### **NEW TRIAL REFUSED**

Move Made for British Columbia Train Robbers Unsuccessful.

Victoria, B. C., June 24.—Edwards (Bill Miner), Dunn and Colquhoun, the three outlaws convicted of the hold-up of the C. P. R. train, and sentenced to life and 25-year terms in the penitentiary, are making strenuous efforts through their counsel, Mr. MacIntyre, to secure a new trial.

This is unusual in criminal matters in British Columbia, where in 99 cases out of 100, a conviction is accepted as finally disposing of the matter in issue. The prisoners' counsel, in presenting his application to Mr. Justice Irving, urged two points-that the prisoners were not asked to plead at their second trial, and that counsel for the crown had referred to the identification of a belt by one of the prisoners, no evidence being offered in this regard upon which

such comment would properly rest. His lordship held that there had been no point ruled upon at the trial which was unfair to the prisoners, and refused to grant a case stated. Mr. MacIntyre will now appeal from

this ruling to the full court at its autumnal session.

malformation. Judge Julian Mack, of Chicago, and Judge Harold Salomon, of Stockholm, Sweden, were sitting on the bench with Judge Barratt in the juvenile court here when this unprecedented order was handed down and both jurists concurred in the thought that too many boys are sent to prison who could be reformed by surgeons.

Since he has made a special study of juvenile crime, Judge Barratt has committed several boys to the State Hospital for the Insane at Norristown, where, under competent medical and surgical treatment, wonders have been worked with incorrigibles.

The action of Judge Barratt in the case of the Haddiman boy was prompted by a letter which Edward Dunlap, burglar, wrote from his cell in willing his brain to the Wistar Institute of Anatomy, and his body to Dr. John Chalmers Da Costa, of Jefferson Medical College.

"I am and have been all my life a criminal," Dunlap wrote. "Why? Was I born too late? Should I have lived in the days of the great adventurers-Drake and Cortez and all other pillagers and conquerors and heroic thieves who could trace their lineage back further than Jason, who quested for the Golden Fleece?

"Or was it because of some subtle quirk in my brain, some cerebral formation, some little grouping of the brain cells, that I, who should have been an honest man, an artist, a poet, perhaps, became a burglar? I do not know, and I have thought hard and long upon the cause. But this, although I do not know, is what I am inclined to think: "Real crime is a disease, or rather

crime is the symptom of a subtle disease of brain and nerve, just as a rash is in some cases a symptom of fever. "Crime moves in waves. There are epidemics of various forms, as there are epidemics of smallpox, of measles. There are criminals who are always criminals of one kind-social cancers, social consumptives. These are, too, criminals who are only cases of social chickenpox and influenza. Certainly crime is contagious. Is there a subtle
