AMERICA, BUT ALIVE THROUGHOUT EUROPE

NEW YORK. Sept. 24.—Baseball is practically dead in America, simply because the professional business is stopped for the period of the war, but the odd part of it is that the game has been transferred to Europe. Over there the championship season comes to an end this week in England. France and Italy. In Italy the game will be played more or less all winter. The Italians seems to have gone wild over the game, and pleas for balls, bats and material come incessantly. Two teams are playing at Rome every Saturday and Sunday, and drawing well.

England already has formed a "major league" for next year, and baseball in France will continue until after the holidays in the southern rest camps near the Riviera.
