POINTS TO INCONSISTENCY.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
I read with a good deal of interest, not unmixed with amusement, the letter signed "Educationalist," in your issue of 4th inst., upon "Osteopathy." It would have been a small space in your column, in which to make a few remarks, if it was not my intention to criticize his words of praise for the osteopaths, with whom I have had no experience and whom, no doubt, are many instances capable men (or women) and efficient in the practice of their profession. My experience has been with the chiropractors, and I feel perfectly free to say that I have derived untold benefit from this form of treatment, and I also have no hesitation in saying, that if the Ontario Legislature decides to put the great "I AM'S" of the Medical Association, it will be another piece of "Prussianism," a form of government, which seems to be growing in popularity with the "powers that be" (wonder if "Educationalist" knows French?) Nor do I purpose to discuss the various "osteos," "chiro's" and "inco's," etc., rung into the letter by the person who hides behind the pseudonym "Educationalist," but by adopting that pseudonym, and using a lot of high-flown language and loud-sounding words, he evidently wishes to be inferred that he is "educated"! Well, he may be to a certain extent, but his education did not include "logic," because he is illogical in his remarks. He refers (I use his own words) to the "persecution of osteopaths" by the "persecuted, bitter, and determined crusade of persecution by allopaths" against osteopaths, forgetting that this crusade is also directed against chiropractors, which he (very properly, too) regards as unfair and unjust, and yet at the same time he avows that "each radically new development in science of healing has always been met by a storm of reproach and bitter opposition," and "Educationalist," in face of his objection to the names of procedure, is adopting the same tactics, to which he objects, towards the chiropractors! Presumably he is either an osteopath or a believer in them, but in any case, he is illogical. "Consistency, thou art a jewel," I am, yours faithfully,

BOLSHEVISM AND CHRISTIANITY.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
May I suggest that political propositions or planks as a reply to J. W. Eaton's letter, which appeared in your issue of February 4, re Bolshevism and Christianity?
If the tillers of the soil and the laboring masses of today and many other organizations, too numerous to mention, want burdens placed upon their shoulders, let them go behind the screen and cast their ballots for lawyers to rule over them. On the other hand, if they want a yoke easy to be borne, so that they might have life, and that more abundantly, let them think not what they shall eat, nor what they shall drink, nor in what they shall be clothed, for that is what the Gentiles seek after; but seek first to establish the ethics of the Apostolic Church, and all these things shall be added unto them. For is it not evident that the ethics of the law came from Moses, but the ethics of Christianity came by Jesus? But who are lawyers? Are they not, as Paul says, men of no mean citizens under the "reign" of law? But stop, look, listen! Are they not identical with the children of the fathers who turned back into Egypt in their heart or mind, and became entangled again in Egyptian bondage? Are they not our own children? Therefore, must we not turn the hearts of the fathers to the children, and the hearts of the children to their fathers, lest God come and smite the earth with a curse? For it is obvious to the wayfaring man and the public-minded kings and rulers of today that it was not over-production or lack of corn in Egypt (for God had provided full and plenty) that brought the Egyptians under the servile chains of public slavery at the end of their

seven-year death; but it was the public carnal-minded "right" of accumulating public, carnal, individual wealth, and the public, carnal-minded competition of the producers of their labor against silver and gold, which is of no intrinsic worth, and the public carnal distribution of the same through their public, carnal, industrial system. So, likewise, it is not the lack of corn in the world today, or the public labor traffic, or public over-production, that causes the children of Bolshevism. Socialists, anarchists, thieves of the soil, and the laboring masses, and many other organizations, too numerous to mention, cry out to the public, carnal-minded political parties for clothes and warmed, that they might have life, and that more abundantly, but it is on account of our public, carnal, economic system, which has come down to us through the public, carnal ethics and traditions of public, carnal-minded men from the carnal-minded ages of oppression and tyranny. A REJOINDER OF BISHOP FALLON.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
In your issue of this date, Canon Tucker attempts to draw a red herring across the track by making certain comments on my sermon of Sunday evening. I do not propose to allow him to so escape the issue raised by himself. On the 3rd instant, Canon Tucker was reported as having said in the pulpit of St. Paul's Cathedral on the day preceding "that the name of the Jesus was substituted for the name of Jesus in a public letter of the 15th instant characterized that statement as 'absolutely false and without any foundation in fact.' On the same day, Canon Tucker repeated his slander in the following terms: 'Leaders of the Catholic Church have been promoting the glories of Mary and ascribing to her the attributes of Christ himself.' In his previous attempt at promoting beliefs in her glories, her name has been substituted in Psalms and in the Te Deum for the name of Christ. On the 5th instant I publicly called upon Canon Tucker 'to show proofs for his incredible distortions of facts that are within the reach of all.'"

There the issue still stands. Canon Tucker desires to evade it; he has not accepted the challenge; he has not produced the proofs. The charge he made is clear and intelligible; it can be established by producing the Psalms and the Te Deum in which the name of the Virgin Mary has been substituted for that of Christ. COKE TAKES DROP
AT GUELPH: IS NOW
SOLD AT \$6.50 TON

Does Not Include Delivery—
Military Drill in Disfavor.

GUELPH, Feb. 11.—The Guelph Light and Heat Commission today decided to reduce the price of coke \$1 per ton. It will in future be \$6.50 per ton, while farmers and those residing outside the city will have to pay \$7 per ton. These prices are for coke at the gas works, and not delivered. The lowering of the price of gas was also considered, but the conclusion was reached that this could not be done until the price of coal had been reduced.
