Churchill Says Britain Fought At Peace Table To Abolish Conscription

Met With No Response Even From United States and Russia—Compulsory Service Ends in Britain March 31—Nation Has Raised New Volunteer Army—New Tank Perfected.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Conscription will be abolished in Great Britain on March 31, and within a month of that date the last conscript will be entitled to be released, it was announced by Winston Churchill, the secretary for war, in moving the army estimates in the House of Commons today. Mr. Churchill stated that Great Britain had succeeded in raising an army organizing an entirely new volunteer army which at the time conscription would lapse would number about 220,000, excluding troops serving in India.

The nation would be able with her reorganized army to place in the field in case of emergency a force of twenty divisions with cavalry and auxiliary services and supplied with modern arms and equipment a British army ever had, the war secretary declared in a memorandum in amplification of his address.

Produced New Tank. Incidentally Mr. Churchill disclosed the fact that a new tank had been produced, with a speed of twenty miles an hour, which has mechanically a long life. In a trial run of 1,000 miles, he said, virtually no wear had developed.

In his speech Mr. Churchill declared that Great Britain had fought at the peace conference for the abolition of conscription, but that there was no response at all to her representations. The only great power which Great Britain succeeded in persuading to abolish conscription was Germany, and that only under duress of compulsion.

Should Be Bigger. Mr. Churchill said that Great Britain's army should be slightly bigger than before the war, but she was returning to arrangements which in principle were identical with those under which the country lived before the war.

It was idle to pretend that Great Britain's pre-war army was proportionate to the risk she ran or to the important part she played and aspired to play in European diplomacy. That was why the removal of the German danger did not in itself allow of any reduction to be made in the garrison of the British Empire.

On the other hand, he explained, new responsibilities overseas had been placed on the country in consequence of the war and besides, the whole eastern world, in which Great Britain was interested more than any other power, was in a state of extreme disquiet.

Real Peace With Turkey. "Considering our burdens throughout the middle east, Constantinople, Egypt, Persia and Mesopotamia," Mr. Churchill said, "no relief can be expected until a real peace is made with Turkey. We have lost ground steadily during the whole of last year, and I trust that, having dispersed our armies we shall not now take steps which would drive the Turkish people to despair or undertake any new obligations, because our resources are not equal to their discharge."

We do not know what peace with Turkey will be made or what degree of acquiescence it will demand of the Turkish people. We do not know what aggressive actions the Russian Bolsheviks will take in this sphere. We do not know how far Viscount Milner's commission may be able to reduce the contention in Egypt; we do not know when our responsibility in Constantinople will terminate or when the expense of maintaining international force there will be taken by an international body.

Example to World. In reply to the debate Mr. Churchill emphasized his confidence in what the country would say when the general election came to a Government which, in abolishing conscription, had set an example to the whole world, even to "pious America."

Capt. William Wedgwood Benn inquired of Mr. Churchill whether he intended to reduce the number of troops in the field. Mr. Churchill replied that he had no intention of doing so, but that he was not prepared to say whether he would or not.

Thanks East Wellington Electors For Acclamation Given Yesterday.

ANNOYS LIBERTY LEAGUE Secretary Says League Made Catspaw—Surprised At Pritchard Quitting.

FERGUS, Ont., Feb. 23.—Confessing to a feeling of loneliness in not having an opponent in the by-election in East Wellington, Mr. Rainey, who was elected yesterday, declared that he believed that he would have been elected even if he had not been elected.

INFLUENZA WANING, BUT FATALITIES WILL CONTINUE, PREDICTION Dr. Hastings Says People Will Try To Fight It.

TORONTO, Feb. 23.—Although the influenza epidemic is perceptibly waning in this city and district, Dr. C. J. Hastings, medical officer of health of Toronto, said tonight that while the epidemic was waning it would continue to take a high toll of life. One reason for this, he said, was that as the epidemic declined the people would lose their fear of it, and fight it when attacked.

Kitchener and several cities in Western Ontario report that the epidemic is subsiding.

At Harrison, Mrs. Lawrence Pridham, aged 58 years, who had gone to the home of her daughter, Mrs. G. M. McDonald, to assist during the illness of several members of the family, died today. Her husband, Mr. McDonald, died this afternoon. Her husband died last Thursday from influenza.

DRURY SAYS FEDERAL POLITICS IS NEXT MOVE FOR FARMERS

Promises Hydro-Electricity For Farm Use.

PETERBORO, Feb. 23.—Premier E. C. Drury, who with G. A. Putman, deputy minister of agriculture, and Mrs. A. R. Brodie of Newmarket, president of the Ontario Farm Women's organization, addressed the Peterboro F. O. at its annual meeting here tonight, intimated that the federal field would be the next stamping ground of the farmers.

In this connection the premier urged the United Farmers and Farm Women's organization to keep their powder dry in preparation for the coming federal general election. An investigation of the educational policy of Ontario, and the extension of hydro-electric facilities to the farmers of the province was promised by Premier Drury. Hydro electric, he added, would give no better returns anywhere than on the farms of Ontario.

OFFICIAL MAJORITY FOR DRURY WAS 2,308 MILTON, Ont., Feb. 23.—Premier E. C. Drury's official majority over E. J. Stephenson, his opponent in the Halton by-election in Halton County, was 2,308. The official figures were given out today by E. L. Hammett, the returning officer. The total vote was as follows: Drury, 4,419; Stephenson, 2,111.

JAMES M. PRITCHARD DIES. TORONTO, Feb. 23.—James M. Pritchard, of this city, a prominent member of the Masonic Order and a number of other fraternal societies, died today. John Pritchard of the Globe editorial staff; H. J. of the assessment staff; this city, and George F. manager of the Bank of Montreal at French, B. C., are brothers of the deceased.
