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At The Theaters

AT THE GRAND.
Baseball and Bolshevism, America's national game and America's national enemy—these two and Booth Tarkington's clever treatment of the theme combine to form a picturesque setting for what is really a great American play. But it requires the exactness and impartiality of a great English actor, George Arliss, to present "Poldek" instructive and entertaining to radical and conservative alike. The orthodox patriot will thrill with the outcast, but loyal American girl, when the band plays and the old soldiers march by, but the other kind of patriot who wants to make a few changes may appreciate the subtle irony in the last act, where the federal officers arrive to seize, as seditious literature, Russian translations to the United States, and the immortal stanzas of "The Star Spangled Banner." What more dangerous doctrine has Bolshevism evolved, after all, than the dictum of "all men born free and created equal," which inspired the American revolution?
Poldek escapes in the first act from

the machine gun of the Czar-loving Cadets in Russia to accompany a Bolshevik band to America, where he is to print their propaganda. Could one blame him for not printing the tawdry phrases and uneven sentences of "Poldek's" dangerous pathological type of malcontent, after he had discovered on a quiet library shelf, the stronger, more virile radicalism of Washington, Tom Paine and Jefferson?

Misplaced seriousness is after all the cause of most of the troubles of individuals, reformers, races and nations alike. Poor old Professor Poldek was deadly in earnest about his anti-bill ideals for human society. Blanche had been too serious in pleasure seeking. Nicolai took himself as well as others too seriously. Same-Americanism prevails because it laughs often, even if it sometimes at inconsistent and incongruous times.

Just why Tarkington gave the police informer's role to the one Canadian ingredient of the melting pot is not clear. Whether, unlike most Nova Scotians, had no sense of poetic appreciation, but then the Russian philosophy of the play is not of poetic philosophy. Poldek, Tarkington, Dostoevsky, Turgenev, nor even of the great nihilist interpreter, "Sartre," whose name is as difficult to spell as to pronounce.

George Arliss as Poldek is the same brilliant and perfected actor who appeared here four years ago in "Disraeli." One of the two or three greatest English actors in spoken drama today, his impersonation of Poldek, the surpassingly clever, leaves without room for criticism. Norma Mitchell, as Blanche, is an unaffected and brilliant actress. Edward Donnelly as Nicolai, and Jean Robertson capably presents the somewhat difficult role of Maria.

Carl Anthony, as Poldek, Guy Cunningham as Pinsky, W. H. Barwald as Donchiff and Stapleton Kent as Kimford, are true impersonators of types as common in America as elsewhere. Edward Donnelly as Nicolai is especially good in the second act, and Irving Deckford gives satisfactory support as police sergeant. The neuro who appears on the stage only for a moment, deserves credit, but his name does not appear on the program. "Poldek" will be presented at the Grand twice today.
