B., July 30 .- At least two men are dead and several others injured as a result of a collision this morning shortly before 8 o'clock, when the suburban train on the Canadian National Railway from Hampton crashed into a long freight train, about a mile outside the city. William Me-Garrity of St. John, the driver on the suburban train, was crushed between the engine and tender, and death was almost instantaneous.
