NOTE AND COMMENT

In the final for the Tankard yesterday, like most games where so much depends on the result, all the players on both sides at times made misses that on other occasions would be easy. Still the curling throw was up to the standard and those spectators who desired to see close contests were surely well rewarded. Both the Caledonian rink conformed to the draw game throw, while the Lindsay players never hesitated to drive an opposing stone thru, even when only on the front ring.

At the close of the play the curlers repaired to the Granite Club-room, where the ceremony of presenting the historic Tankard was gone thru in short order. Vice-President David Carlyle made an oration of about one minute duration. J. D. Flavell accepted the trophy in his usual pleasant and modest manner, saying a nice word for the vanquished. Robert Rennie replied for the runners-up, making the important statement that the Caledonians would keep at it, tho in some quarters the idea was prevalent that this would be their last attempt to lift the Tankard.

This is Lindsay's fifth championship, winning the lot in 12 years, while the present generations of Caledonians have never done better than figure as the last competing club in seven years. The Caledonians won a Tankard final just 26 years ago.

Before another week is over it is expected that the fans will be informed officially of the appointment of Tim Flood, the man who booted the umpire at Diamond Park last summer and went to jail for 15 days, as manager for the St. Paul team this year. OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—The third day's trotting of the Central Canada Trotting Association to-day was witnessed by even a larger crowd than the two previous days.
